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SAYS THE WAR WILL
LAST HUNDRED YEARS

Berlin, Oct. 22.—(Correspondence)—
Houston Stewart Chamberlain, who, al-
though the son of an English admiral,
has become a German, has contributed
to one of the Hamburg newspapers a
statement of his views on the present
and future relations between England
and Germany.

He is convinced that the war between
the two countries will last for at least
a hundred years.

He does not mean, he explains, that
the present fighting will continue for so
long a time, but rather that an interna-
tional struggle has commenced of which
the world-war is but a phase.

ONE MAN AGAINST A MULTITUDE

Jesse L. Lasky's photo-production of
