TORN WILL IS FILED. Foster Brother Explains Mutilation of Document to Court.

New York, May 25. — The will of John Bott, late of 39 Proctor street, Gledale, Queens, which disposes of an estate valued at \$2,000, was filed for estate valued at \$2,000, was filed for probate in the Surrogates Court, Jamaica, by Henry Essendorf' a foster brother, of the same address, who is made sole legatee and executor. The document was badly torn.

Essendorf explained that on Nov. 30, 1901, he went with Bott to a notary, and they drew up two wills, in which each left all his property to the other. After Bott died, he declared, he had the two wills in front of him, and was about to tear up his own, which was no longer of any value. By mistake he tore Bott's will.

S. by mail).—There is today in Jugoslavia a scarcity of bank notes of large denominations, and earthen jugs. The peasants are hoarding the former and hiding them away in the latter.

The peasants' bank is a jug buried in the ground. As they have become very rich in the last few years, their paper money accumulations, buried in the ground as they used to hide corper and silver coin before the war, were eaten up by mice and rats. Now the peasants have learned to pút their paper money in tightly corked jugs, hence the scarcity of Jugs. When possible the peasants obtain bank-notes of large denominations for hoarding purposes, as the jugs are too quickly filled with small value bills.
