NEW GROUP ON CROSS BENCHES

Two Supporters of the Campbell Amendment

Necessary Business, Adjourn House, Have Census, Then Re-distribution and Election His Suggested Programme.

Ottawa, March 1-(Canadian Press).

A new group has taken definite shape in the cross benches of the House of Commons.


It supports a scheme whereby parliament is asked to take a prolonged recess as soon as essential legislation is disposed of, to await the completion of the census and the drafting of a bill for the redistribution of electoral constituencies.

An amendment to this effect was introduced in parliament yesterday by J. A. Campbell, Nelson, and is supported by two other members of the "no man's land" contingent, F. L. Davis of Neepawa, Man., and W. A. Buchanan, Lethbridge.

Hon. The report covered the demobilization work of the department during the past fiscal year.

Referring to the question of imperial military policy, it stated that this was a question which would doubtless be fully considered by the cabinet ministers when

they attended the forthcoming imperial conference.

T. W. Caldwell, member for Carleton-Victoria, is protesting against the cutting down of the service on the Fredericton-Centerville section of the Valley Railway. He also is after better shipping facilities between the port of St. John and Havana, Cuba, especially for potatoes. He advocates the special customs duty on commercial fertilizer.

C. P. R. TO RESUME HOLIDAY RATES

Toronto, March 1.—It was said here last night that special summer holiday rates will be restored by the C. P. R. on June 1 next when a reduction of 25 per cent on the regular rate will be granted on occasions.

This will be the first year for special inducements to tourists since the special holiday rates ceased on account of the war.

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
