Word will arrive here late this afternoon. As today is the Fourth of July and a holiday in the States all the major league teams are booked for double headers.

The Chicago Americans gave Cleveland a bad beating yesterday when they pounded in seventeen runs. Local enthusiasts who are interested in the scores will be feeling elated if they hold Chicago on their ticket this week.

The Boston Braves made a clean sweep of their series with the Phillies and as a result they have forced Jack Combs' team into the cellar. Philadelphia fans could hardly be expected to back their teams when both are losing almost every day. It will be a good thing if Jack Barry is appointed manager of the Combs' Mack. It looks as if Combs has either lost his managerial ability or else lacks interest. Barry is a clever player and leader and may build the team up and whip it into some kind of fighting trim.

33,000 for Charities.

Toledo, Ohio, July 1.—Toledo's charities were enriched by \$33,000 today when Tex Rickard, promoter of the Willard-Dempsey heavyweight contest, turned over this amount to C. F. Wall, chairman of the Toledo Bowling Commission, director of public safety. The money represents the first payment on 7 per cent. of the gross gate receipts promised to Toledo's charities.

Later more money is due the charity fund, Promoter Rickard said. The \$30,000 was paid merely as an advance on account. It represents only 7 per cent of receipts approximately \$420,000, and Rickard today admitted that the advance sale, actual cash in hand, had already gone beyond the \$200,000 mark and was rapidly approaching \$500,000.

Toledo, July 3.—Bills Mike of St.

Paul Moore, American bantam weight who will fight Jimmy Wilde of England, the flyweight champion, in a twenty-round battle in London on July 17, has arrived in England with his manager, Ed Barry, and will spend a few days in Paris, after which he will start training for his fight. He will get into condition for the contest by flying to London on the boat, and will then fly to Paris, where he will stay until he is ready to fight.
