YOUNG WANTS REFUND

\$46,000 Given During War Needed to Help Soldiers
Dawson, Y. T., August 12.—Lieut. W. G. Bradford, in charge of the Dominion branch of the Federal Soldiers' Relief, has opened an office here with Gustave Vauklere, a Princess Patricia veteran, as assistant. The Dawson re-establishment committee, composed of civilians, met and heard Dr. Thompson, M. P., and Lieut. Bradford speak, after which it was decided to ask Ottawa to return \$46,000 to the Yukon which had been sent there as patriotic funds, on the ground that the Yukon has a large number of returned soldiers, and this territory did not receive one dollar for munitions or other war orders which were so lavishly given to other provinces.
