**Daily Hints For the Cook**

Griddle Cakes. Into 1 cup of sweet milk stir enough flour, with 1 teaspoon of baking powder sifted in it to make a smooth, creamy batter, add a good-sized pinch of salt, pour onto a hot buttered griddle and fry to a golden brown, turning carefully to preserve the round, even shape. If sour milk is used, dissolve 1 teaspoon of soda in it, and omit the baking powder. An egg or eggs may be added, but they rather toughen the cakes than add to their goodness.

Meat Croquettes. Chop any kind of cold meat, enough to make a pint. Set 1/2 pint of milk over the fire, then rub together 1 tablespoon of butter and 2 of flour, add to the hot milk and stir until thin and smooth. Season the meat with salt, pepper, a little onion juice, if liked, and a tablespoon of chopped parsley, also a little celery seed, if you like it. Mix the meat with the paste and set aside to cool. When cold form into croquettes, dip in beaten egg, roll lightly in crumbs and fry in deep fat.

Escalloped Potatoes. Peel potatoes, cut in quarters, then slice across the quarters. For 8 medium potatoes use 8 or 4 onions, as you may like best, salt and pepper. Put


