This Case Ends
For failure to prosecute, the district attorney has caused the indictments found in 1906 against Kit Norton and Harry Williams for robbing Warner Van Norden of \$25,000, to be dismissed. Van Norden is a son of the founder of the Van Norden Trust Company, this city, and had an allowance of something like \$50,000 a year, which he spent freely about town.

Counsel for the women contended that the young millionaire feared the notoriety that the case promised to create if put to trial and decided to let the case go by default.

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stained and fretted until the clerk of the divorce court imparted the all-important information that her case was on the calendar, but no special date had been set for its trial.

Must Pay the Tax
While widows have been generally distributed by many learned judges, into two great classes—"grass" and "rod,""Surrogate Fowler this week dealt a judicial blow to the divorced type of the "grass" variety, which would seem to put the term "widow" as applied to a divorcee, out of the legal running.

The surrogate's ruling grew out of the effort of Mrs. Augusta Temple Merritt to escape a state transfer tax on a bequest of a fund of \$50,000 left to her by Mrs. Julia Merritt, the mother of the husband she divorced. Two years before the elder

Mrs. Merritt's death, an agreement was made by which the son's wife should have \$2,500 during her life or until she remarried. An additional evidence of Mrs. Merritt's affection for the son's former wife was the bequest.

Mrs. Merritt sought to evade an appraiser's tax of 5 per cent. on the fund under the section of the law providing that the "wife or widow of a son" is required to pay only a one per cent. tax. "The word 'widow,'" said the surrogate, "has a certain well-defined meaning, viz.: a woman who has lost her husband by death and remains unmarried. The words used to describe a woman who has been divorced from her husband are equally free from ambiguity and are not now regarded as synonymous with the word 'widow.' It would appear that it was not the intention of the legislature to include within the significance of the words 'wife or widow of a son' a divorced wife of a son."

The surrogate's opinion closes by stating that the appraiser properly levied a 5 per cent. tax on the inheritance and directed that an order be issued accordingly.
