RADICAL CHANGE IN GOVERNMENT OF METHODIST CHURCH

An Agitation to be Spread Throughout United States Has Been Started in New York

New York, April 4.—The Laymen's Association of the Methodist Episcopal church of New York, meeting simultaneously with the New York conference has voted by a large majority to petition the general council to establish diocesan bishops, abolish the office of district superintendent (presiding elder), rearrange conference boundaries throughout the United States, give lay members representation in annual and general conferences and extend the terms of pastors from two to five years.

This programme it is understood, embraces the most radical changes confronting Methodism since the days of John Wesley and marks, it is said, the beginning of a far-reaching campaign in which the association will enlist the support of every similar organization and committee in the country. The convention of the general conference will be held during 1911-12 or prior to the convention of the next year. Many conferences are in session now and those which cannot be reached before adjournment will have their next annual meeting before them for action next year.

Each conference will be asked to join in the petition. "The office of district superintendent is unnecessary and expensive and a thing of the past," reads the resolution adopted here. "If control and efficiency is the principle of the modern business world, why not put it into the church rather than keep an antiquated system that is inefficient, uneconomical and productive of great abuse?"

"The conferences are too large," the resolution continues. "In the half dozen conferences of the state of New York, more than half are partially out of the state and some are in other states. It is possible for the state to be so moved that never in his lifetime of effective service can he exercise his rights to vote or have a very great influence in civic questions?"

The routine visits of district superintendents, the association declares, should be abolished. "For they do nothing that the present official board cannot do very much better." In adopting a separate resolution declaring for the extension of the term of pastors from two to five years, the existing time limit was characterized as "generally disadvantageous to ministers, laymen and a hindrance to the work in many of our churches."

Methodism must soon reckon Mormonism with their chief problems, according to Mrs. May Leonard Woodruff, Porto Rico superintendent of the Women's Home and Missionary Society, which met in conjunction with the conference meeting.

CONCERT TONIGHT Preparations have been made for an excellent concert to celebrate the Church tonight. St. Mary's Band will play several selections. An excellent programme of solo, readings and recitations has been arranged and an enjoyable evening is expected.

Daily Hints for the Cook

HOMINY PUFFS. Hominy puffs are another delicious southern dish served for luncheon and breakfast. Take one quart of cold boiled hominy, two four heaping tablespoons of flour, two teaspoons of baking powder, one cup of sweet milk, one teaspoonful of salt and four eggs. Use thoroughly cooked hominy and when cold stir in the well-beaten yolks, then flour, milk and salt alternately with the baking powder. Add last the whites of eggs beaten to a stiff froth and stirred slowly. Have hot boiling and drop the mixture in with a spoon and fry a rich brown. CREAMED LOBSTER. Cook till smooth 3 tablespoonfuls of butter, 3 tablespoonfuls of flour and 2 cups of milk. Season with 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon lemon juice, 1 teaspoon minced parsley. Stir in 2 cups of chopped lobster meat mixed with 1/2 cup of bread crumbs. Take from fire and serve at once in pastry shells baked in patty tins. Serve with lettuce and celery salad. SALMON WITH POTATO BORDER. Cook 6 large potatoes, then mash and season as for serving. Turn into a buttered baking dish and press the potato around the edge. Put an unpeeled can of best salmon over the fire in a pot of boiling water and boil hard for 20 minutes. When the potatoes are browned take from the oven, remove the bowl, fill the center of the dish with the contents of the salmon can.


