"There never has been and it seems as if there never will be. We have paid dearly for our patriotism. Things we feared have become realities and we are today in a serious condition of discontent with the rest of Canada. These provinces will seede if we do not get just treatment which we have never had for the last fifty years. We have waited far too long and we shall not delay in putting our purpose into effect. We are as firm in our faith in the British connection as ever, but we are of British blood, and we shall not submit longer to such treatment as has been handed out to us.
