Harry Cole, the suspected North Coast Limited train robber, tried to escape from the police station and was shot dead by Patrol Driver Charles Jackson.

An immense mob gathered immediately. An impression is abroad that Detective Charles McGarvey did the killing. Cole's brother and cousin headed a mob, which got a rope and went to the station to lynch McGarvey.

Timothy Cole then made an impassioned address on the court house steps, asking the crowd to avenge his brother. He spoke till he was hoarse and five thousand men followed him again to the city jail.
