What's the Matter with Mr. Hawke? Mr. J. T. Hawke, it appears, was in Ottawa last week and telegraphed his paper, the Moncton Transcript, as follows on Thursday:—

Brothers in Arms. (Montreal Star.) The St. James' Gazette, commenting on the recent heroic incident of the South African campaign, says: "Let it be said with all frankness, coupled with sorrow for the men who have fallen with their faces to the enemy, that the stand made by the Canadians at Rooyal, on the Brakrivier, was as inspiring a piece of heroism as was ever presented to the eyes of his long and moving phases."

Charltonism. Mr. John Charlton, who is a well-meaning member of the Canadian Parliament, has, during his tenure of

that position, been the cause of wanting a great deal of its time. He seems to be impressed with the idea that the enactment of laws and the passing of resolutions on moral and religious subjects by both body will overcome original and all other kinds of sin.

The New Campaign. The appointment of Major-General Earl of Dunsdown, C. V. O., to command the Canadian militia is a happy one, for not only has he family been connected with the Dominion for a long time, but not a little of his military reputation in the present war was made whilst having Canadian troops under his command.

Advances of Ottawa Letter. Ottawa, 25th April.—This has been a week of considerable activity in Parliament, and to that extent it has been a welcome relief from those long weeks when but one subject was under discussion.

THE CATTLE GUARD QUESTION. A proposal of a Bill introduced by the member for Lincoln. This is a live topic in the Province of Ontario, having been taken up at the Farmers' Institute and kept before the rural mind by agricultural papers.

RAILWAY SUBSIDIES. On Tuesday the general question of railway subsidies came up in connection with an application of the Red Deer Valley Railway Company. The debate was important because of the information given by the Minister of Railways that the Government had determined to discontinue the policy of granting subsidies indiscriminately.

THE S. S. "Lake Superior". The captain of the steamer, Lake Superior, which was stranded on Round Reef, will within St. John harbor, has been exonerated from all blame by the Maritime Commission.
