Reports and Disasters.

Hubbard, N. S., April 17.—The Nova Scotia fishing schooner Uranus, 91 tons, Captain Siebert Coolen, of Hubbards, was run into on the fishing grounds 100 miles from Lunenburg West of Sable Island, at three o'clock on Wednesday morning. All on board the Uranus are safe. The weather was thick with fog at the time of the collision. The Uranus was struck amidships. Seven of her crew scrambled aboard the American schooner, Captain Coolen and ten men remained on board trying to save their effects. In the meantime the American schooner moved off, and as the Uranus was sinking the duties were launched, and the men entered them, expected to get on board of the other vessel.

Shipping Notes.
Steamship Manchester, Exchange arrived from Manchester via Halifax last evening with a general cargo.

Donaldson line steamer Saturnia from Glasgow landed 385 passengers at the west end yesterday morning. The newcomers are a fine class, with money to buy fairs in New Brunswick.

The cable steamer MacKay-Bennett left Halifax about noon yesterday to go to the scene of the wreck of the big White Star liner Titanic to endeavor to recover the bodies and to bring the remains of others for whom no request has been made to bring to port.

Fires on board steamers carrying coal from Calcutta, which are such a frequent cause of loss to underwriters, have again begun.

The S. S. Zinda, with a cargo valued at \$7,000, is anchored off Cape Comorin with fire in her holds, and is a total loss. She is valued at \$20,000 and is insured here, as is also the coal—Syrén Shipping.

Wednesday's Portland Argus says: The tug Pelopoeus will go into commission today and start in business at once in the towage of the four barges belonging to the Sagadahoc Towing Co., which will be employed in bringing pulpwood from Salmon River, N. B., to Bath. It is expected that about 20,000 cords of pulpwood will be landed at Bath during the season.

The British steamers Newport News and Caterino will commence bringing pulpwood here from Dainouise and Chatham, N. B., about the first of May, having been chartered by the International Paper Company for the season. They are both Parnass-Withey boats and are good carriers. The Caterino has been in port here once before, having brought a cargo of china clay for the Maine Central from Fowey, England. About 50,000 cords of pulpwood have been landed here during the season each year of late, and it is expected that the receipts this year will be fully as large.—Portland Argus.
