CEYLON'S A HIGH FIELD FOR JEWELS

Island is Famous for Precious Gems—Sold Largely to American, German and British Tourists.

Ceylon has long been famed for its precious stones, and probably more people in the world today know it for its beautiful gems than for any other product. Every year thousands of American tourists go to Ceylon to find small fortunes, or at least to pick up bargains, in precious stones, and many of them fall victims to the wily native merchant, whom they not infrequently consider ignorant of the true value of the gems.

The precious stones found in Ceylon are rubies, blue, yellow, white and pink sapphires; asteria, or star stones; alexandrites, beryls, chrysoberyls, cat's-eyes, amethysts, topazes, garnets, moonstones, zircons (jargons and hyacinths), spinels aquamarines, tourmalines, peridots and olivines; in short, nearly every gem known to the lapidary except turquoise, diamonds, opals and emeralds.

The gem fields begin at Avissawella, some thirty miles from Colombo, and extend to about the eighty-fifth mile on the Rakwana road and from there due south to Matara. Nearly all of the productive areas lying in the districts of Ratnapura and Kegalle, of Sabaragamuwa province, and in the Southern Province. The Central Province about Matale and Kandy, produces only moonstones, garnets, amethysts, pink quartz and tourmalines. No precious stones are found here, but quantities of abrasive corundum of the nature of sapphires and rubies are obtained. In the Southern Province are cat's-eyes, tourmalines, chrysoberyls and alexandrites, the best of which are found in the Welliam district. Sapphires are rare and rubies not common. In the Ratnapura district every gem of Ceylon is found, though alexandrites are rare.

About 1906 a new bed of extraordinarily fine garnets of a dark puce color was discovered at Pella, in the Southern Province. These have been sold by native dealers as spinels, but in reality are very fine dark garnets and might be mistaken for Siamese rubies or spinel rubies. About the same year new fields of moonstones were discovered on crown lands in the village called Pella, one and a half miles due east from the seacoast, in the Southern Province and fifty miles from Colombo. As with most of the stones, this deposit of the finest blue and white sheen moonstones was found in low lying swamp lands. The discovery of these stones in large quantities was most timely and important, as the mines about Kandy and Wagawella were about worked out. These stones from these mines are sent to Idar, on the Rhine, where there is an important semi-precious stone cutting industry.

Until within the last year gem mining in Ceylon was purely a native industry. Various attempts have been made by European companies to exploit the gem mining lands, but all have been unsuccessful. In December last for the first time a company undertook the hydraulic mining of gems. Some London capitalists organized a \$500,000 company and secured options on the lands of native chiefs in the Ratnapura district, near Maralaya. They have turned streams on the gravel and are now washing out the rough stones with fair success and with a good deal of promise for a rich future. The lands so mined are to be held on long leases at one-fifth of the profits, and all gems found are to be sold at public auction in Colombo. Besides gems, gold and tin in promising quantities have already been obtained. The opening of this hydraulic mining enterprise promises, if successful, to revolutionize gem mining in Ceylon and to affect seriously the world market in precious stones.

Aside from the methods employed by this company, all gem mining is done on the old native system. The gem miner selects his land in likely territory and arranges terms for its exploitation. He then employs a number of natives more or less skilled in detecting rough stones. They dig pits, usually ten to fifty feet deep, in the gravel, called "tumm," in which the stones are found and washed over the gravel carefully. This is practically all there is of the business. Sometimes large and fine stones are found.

CANADIAN CUSTOMS OFFICERS STOPPING BORDER SMUGGLING

Place Ban on Buying Goods in Maine Unless Duty is Paid — Will Search Parcels.

Eastport, Me., Sept. 23.—It isn't going to be as easy in the future for those who live on the New Brunswick side of the border to do their shopping here as in the past. Canadians who have been in the habit of coming to Eastport on the steamer Viking, and making purchases, are hereafter to be met on their return to Campbellville by a Canadian customs official, who will open up suit cases and bundles and collect duty on American purchases.

Those who are in the habit of making the trip in their own motor boats will be somewhat more fortunate in this respect, as it is not planned to extend the inspection to these craft for the present. But, sooner or later, customs officers are to be stationed along the shores of both Campbellville and Deer Island.

but the industry is generally precarious for the individual. No trustworthy statistics are obtainable of the quantity of precious stones exported annually from the island. Local dealers estimate that gems of the value of \$1,000,000 are sent every year to London and to Paris, chiefly rubies, sapphires of all shades and star stones. This, of course, has nothing to do with the vast quantities disposed of each year to tourists. American jewellers get practically no gems direct from Ceylon, but buy from the European markets.

The local trade is principally with tourists. All of the jewelry shops are supported almost exclusively by the tourist trade. In former days American tourists were regarded as the most liberal patrons, but of recent years German, Dutch and British travellers have taken their place. Most of the stones and jewelry sold to these travellers are of European production, but there is a large and increasing trade with them in European made jewelry from Germany, France and England.

Commercial travellers from these countries especially platinum, gold and silver mounts, amethysts and other inexpensive stones and jewelry from Idar.

WORLD NEWS CONDENSED

Fierce Fighting Again Breaks Out in Balkans—Supports Deportation of Thaw—Prairie Afire.

Vienna, Sept. 23.—In a fierce battle today between Serbian troops and Albanians on the new Albanian frontier, 300 Albanians were killed, according to a despatch to the Neue Freie Presse. The fighting is reported to have occurred at a place between Dibra and Jakova where many of the battles between the Serbians and Turks were fought in the recent Balkan war.

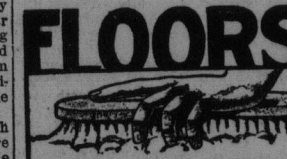
Support Deportation.
Montreal, Sept. 23.—The appeal court this morning decided that the Minister of Justice, Hon. Charles Doherty, was entitled to ignore the writ of habeas corpus secured by Messrs. N. K. Ladouceur, K. C., and J. N. Greenhalgh for Thaw in an attempt to prevent his deportation after the Coast Court meeting of the board of enquiry of the immigration authorities, who decided to reject the Matsewan fugitive. The court contended that the original writ should have been served on the immigration authorities instead of copies.

Prairie Fires.
Lethbridge, Alb., Sept. 23.—Meagre reports of what is probably one of the most destructive prairie fires yet recorded are just beginning to sift through from the district affected. The fire started eight miles northeast of Stirling and R. C. Harvey, who had some difficulty in getting his sheep out of the track of the fire, says a million dollars will not cover the damage to the range. The fire started at three p. m., and swept southwards for nearly twenty miles, spreading over about five miles in width. One of the farmers, who lives near Stirling, says he said to have lost valuable crops.

Militants on Warpath.
Liverpool, Sept. 23.—Militant suffragettes set fire to Seaforth House at Seaforth, four miles to the northwest of Liverpool, during last night, and caused damage estimated at \$100,000. The members of the "Arson squad" left a quantity of literature strewn about the house. The building, which was formerly used as a convent, was undergoing reconstruction at a cost of \$100,000, and was to be turned into a home of imbeciles. The entire institution is valued at nearly \$1,000,000.

Beef War Probable.
Montreal, Sept. 23.—It is asserted that a Montreal cow, over 100 pounds of live beef have been shipped from Montreal during the last three weeks to United States cities. Thirty-four of the cows were sent to the market for shipment over the line. The buying has so cut into the local packers' interest that they threaten to stop the shipments. If American buyers continue to take the supplies offered there, to stop purchasing at the stock yards and secure their future supplies through agents in the country.

Will Make Sure.
New York, Sept. 23.—The aged father of Johann (Hans) Schmidt, self-confessed murderer of Anna Ammiller, has decided to come to New York from his home in Aachenburg, Germany, according to a despatch received here from the German town last night. Schmidt still hopes to find that the accused priest is not their son.

SPANISH WILL TAKE PART IN PANAMA-PACIFIC EXPOSITION, IS SAID

Spanish Premier Makes Statement to Associated Press—Funds will be Secured by Special Law.

Madrid, Sept. 23.—Count Alvaro De Romanones, the Spanish premier, informed the Associated Press today that Spain would participate officially in the Panama-Pacific Exposition at San Francisco in 1915. He said he had returned from San Sebastian especially to preside over the meeting of the cabinet this afternoon at which the decision to participate would probably be voted. The necessary funds are to be provided by a special law to be introduced into the Spanish parliament. The decision to participate is understood, was due greatly to the influence of King Alfonso, who particularly desired to see Spain officially represented.

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be held for twenty years, renewable at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 240 acres can be located by one applicant. Royalty, five cents per acre. In unusual cases the Minister may be stated by the applicant in the Agent or sub-Agent of Dominion Lands and the rental for the first year must be paid to the agent within thirty days after the date of the grant.

QUARTZ.—A person eighteen years of age and over who has made a discovery in any locality a claim 1,600 feet by 1,600 feet. At least 240 acres can be located by one applicant. Royalty, five cents per acre. In unusual cases the Minister may be stated by the applicant in the Agent or sub-Agent of Dominion Lands and the rental for the first year must be paid to the agent within thirty days after the date of the grant.

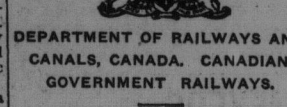
