

# A FARMER FOR THREE WEEKS

**Wellington, Me., Farmer Has Trying Experience—Rescue Near, but Could Not Aid Him.**

Harmony, Me., Feb. 11.—Imprisoned in a windmill of his own construction for three days while a steady breeze kept the arms revolving and prevented his escape, was the fate of Edwin Pike, a Wellington farmer. Pike was without food or water, and was completely exhausted Tuesday, when the breeze died down and he was able to step the arms from their mad whirl. "I know now how a squirrel feels when it attempts to crawl out of a revolving cage," he said.

Pike entered the crank chamber of the mill through a door between two of the sails to oil the machinery when the wind suddenly started blowing. The imprisoned man called for help, but wife, children and neighbors were powerless to stop the wind mill, as he had neglected to provide any means for shutting off the machinery. Family and neighbors prayed that the wind might cease, but for three days, according to the wind gauge, it blew more than 30 miles an hour, driving the mill at such velocity that communication with Pike was impossible. Suffering from cold, hunger, thirst and want of sleep, he felt that he could endure his position no longer when the wind died down and he was able to stop the mill. He had to be helped into the house.

His first act, upon recovering, was to nail the sail frames to the tower. "I built a mill that would stop," said Pike. "Now I'm going to rebuild it so that it will stop."

# NEW SYSTEM OF VALUATION

**Ex-Ald. Willistoe Favors 50 p. c. Exemption of Tax on Improvements—Full Value Taxation on Land.**

Newcastle, Feb. 10.—About noon yesterday Mrs. Eliza Getchell died at the home of her niece, Mrs. W. B. McMillan, Jacques River. Death was due to paralysis, which attacked her about a week ago. Mrs. Getchell had lived with Mrs. McMillan for about three years. Previous to that her home was in Nelson, Northumberland Co., and later in Newcastle with her niece, Miss Helen M. McLeod. The remains will reach Newcastle by tomorrow morning's express, and the funeral will leave Miss McLeod's residence for interment in St. James' churchyard.

Mrs. Getchell, who lived here for some years, up to three years ago, was well and favorably known, having many friends, who will regret to hear of her death.

The Methodist Men's Union last night Ex-Ald. Howard Willistoe advocated asking for legislation to enable the town to secure a new valuation which would be binding upon the assessors, land and buildings to be valued separately, improvements exempted at least 50 p. c., and land taxed at full value, income to be assessed.

# ARMY CONGRESS

**Representatives from Fifty-eight Countries to Attend—Five Hundred in Canadian Contingent.**

The Salvation Army is established in 48 different countries and colonies throughout the world, and representatives from these will meet in London, England, next June. This huge gathering will be known as "The International Congress."

The Canadian contingent will consist of 240 officers and 300 local officers and soldiers, including three brass bands, namely, The Territorial Staff Band, Toronto, the Peterborough Band and another representing Western Canada. Reservation for accommodation have been made on the following boats: Alaskan, Royal George, Empress of Britain, Teutonic and Andania.

The reception to the delegates will take place in the Royal Albert Hall on June 11th, after that the meetings will be held in a corrugated iron building, seating 5,000 people, which has been erected for this purpose in the heart of the great Metropolis. Other demonstrations will be held in different parts of London and the largest of these is planned for June 23rd at the famous Crystal Palace.

A new feature of this year's congress will be a tour of 300 delegates for special missionary campaigns in cities such as Bristol, Birmingham, Liverpool, Leeds, Glasgow and Edinburgh, etc.

The Canadian representation will be in charge of Commissioner David M. Rees and Colonel Sydney Malmgren.

## GOLD IN AUSTRALIA.

The first discovery of gold in Australia was made sixty-three years ago today by Edward Hargraves. He had gone to California with the gold rush of '49, and was struck with the similarity between the strata and rocks of California and those of his own district of New South Wales. He was the first to find gold in Australia, and his return home he began digging, and on Feb. 12, 1851, he struck gold in considerable quantities. News of his find caused intense excitement throughout New South Wales, and thousands flocked to the new El Dorado. A few months later an aborigine found a large amount of gold in a hole of quartz. A little later a miner found 112 pounds of gold in three blocks of quartz. The "Victoria nugget," a mass of almost 240 ounces of gold, was found in the Bendigo diggings. Another famous nugget, "The Welcome," weighed 201 ounces. During the first ten years of the gold discoveries the precious metal in Australia sold to the value of about \$480,000,000 was shipped to England. The 16 years beginning with 1849 was the decade of gold, beginning with the discovery of the valuable metal in California, and followed by similar discoveries in Australia in 1851 and in British Columbia in 1858.

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING REGULATIONS.

THIS section of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, who has been a resident of available Dominion lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta, the applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at the office of any Local Agent of Dominion Lands (not sub-agent) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required in every case, except when residence is performed in the vicinity.

In the vicinity districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$2 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to secure title to the land) and extra cultivation. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough scrubby or stony land after report by Homestead Inspector on application for patent.

A homesteader who has exhausted his pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts of the West. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 80 acres and erect a house worth \$200.
