FREDERICTON HOTEL KEEPER TO APPEAL CASE TO SUPREME COURT

Police Raid Another Hotel at Capital — Kitchener Memorial Concert in Wilmot Park.

Fredericton, N. B., Sept. 10.—A Kitchener memorial concert was played by Fredericton brass band at Wilmot Park this afternoon, a chorus of fifty male voices singing a number of hymns. Lieut.-Col. Guthrie made a short patriotic address, paying a warm tribute to the late Lord Kitchener and calling for recruits for the 140th Battalion during the campaign to be carried on by Lieut.-Col. L. H. Beer and officers in New Brunswick next week for 100 men to bring that regiment up to full strength.

The police raided Victoria hotel on Saturday night and secured two bottles of liquor.

The proprietor of Long's hotel recently convicted of a subsequent offense against the Canada Temperance Act, has appealed from the judgment of Police Magistrate Limerick and will carry the case to the Supreme Court on certiorari.

FISHERIES EXPERTS VISIT YARMOUTH

Yarmouth, Sept. 9.—The power cruiser Prince, of the Biological station at St. Andrews, N. B., in command of Captain Elmer Rigby, arrived in port yesterday. She has a distinguished party on board, consisting of the following: Professor Prince, Dominion Commissioner of Fisheries; Dr. A. G. Huntsman, curator of the Biological Station, St. Andrews; Bruce Wilson, of the Toronto University; Arthur Calder, of St. Andrews.

Their purpose here is to investigate the distribution of shrimp and other small marine life, and they are also trying to ascertain what fish spawn, if any, reaches maturity in these waters. For the purpose of carrying on these investigations they are carrying all kinds of nets and trawls, from those made of the finest of silk which are intended to stop even the

minutest of living organisms in our waters, to the coarse and the heavy appliances used by our commercial fishermen.

This week they have been engaged in searching the depths of the Bay of Fundy, not far off this coast in 111 fathoms of water and their specimen bottles are full of many interesting species of small life.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applications must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made by any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Notice is hereby given that upon and cultivation of the land in each of the three years, a homesteader may live on at least 40 acres, on certain conditions.

A homestead is a habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$5.00 per acre.

Notice is hereby given that on or before three years after entering a homestead patent a so 80 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.
