FREDERICTON.

Fred. N. B., Jan. 3.—(Special)—Municipal lighting has been in vogue here for one year, and the result has been very satisfactory. The service has been greatly improved, and citizens are all pleased with the change. The cost of operating, as shown by a report submitted to the council by Ald. Farrell this evening, was \$330.00. Before purchasing the plant the council invited tenders for the service and the best offer was \$65 a lamp for sixty-six lamps; total of \$6,930.

The members of the factory commission were this evening entertained to dinner by Mayor Palmer at his residence. During the afternoon they visited the shoe factory and establishment of the John Palmer Company, Ltd. They will leave for Woodstock tomorrow morning.
