ONTARIO FARMERS LOCK HORNS WITH MANUFACTURERS ON TARIFF QUESTION
Urge Government to Drop Protection and Frame a Tariff for Revenue Only—The Argument in Detail.

The Farmers' Association of Ontario has issued copies of its recent memorial to the tariff question which was sent to the dominion government. The memorial follows:
We, the Dominion Grange, Farmers' Association of Ontario, and Manitoba Grain Growers' Association, desire, in view of the approach of the tariff revision session of the dominion parliament, to express, through our executive officers, the views of organized agriculture in Canada on the question about to occupy the attention of the parliament of the dominion.
The farmers of Canada have become generally alarmed at the aggressive campaign carried on by the Manufacturers' Association during the past few years with a view of having the tariff made more protective than it is now. When protection was first asked for, we were assured that what was requested would be required but a short time in order to allow our manufacturing industries to secure a fair footing.
The result has been that the tariff has become more protective than it was in 1857, when it was first asked for. It is now a tariff of 25 per cent by 1880. Today we have an average tariff on dutiable goods about one and one-half per cent higher than it was when the protective tariff became effective. And yet, with the inroads of this period granted to the manufacturers of the twentieth century, we find the cry is still for more. The more there is given, and the less the requirement for giving the greater are the demands made. If a halt is not at once called we shall find conditions in this country similar to those prevailing in parts of Europe, with a small class of wealthy barons at the top and a vast mass of the population being the laboring and farming classes.

DOMINION STEEL CO. MUST TAKE RUN OF MINE SAYS JAS. ROSS
Six Houses Quarantined, and Schools and Churches Closed—News of Fredericton.
Fredericton, N. B., Nov. 19.—Two more houses at Marysville were quarantined this morning owing to the epidemic of diphtheria, which is becoming most serious. There are now six houses quarantined. The schools are all closed and the churches are closed for the rest of the week at least.
Miss McAdam, teacher at the primary department of the Charlotte street school, this city is laid up with diphtheria at her home. The school room has not been fumigated, the chairman of the board, who is also the attending physician, declines to have the school reopened until the public. The directors say there is no foundation for the report lately circulated that the merger had fallen through.
