Port which vessels have arrived from.

A red Flag from Great Britain  
A red-and-white do the Mediterranean  
A red Pendant, the Continent of Europe  
A white-and-red Pendant, Madeira, Canary or Western Isles  
A blue Flag, West-Indies  
A blue Pendant, Bermudas, Bahamas or Turk's Islands  
A blue-and-white Flag, United States  
A white Flag, Newfoundland  
A red-and-white Flag, horizontally divided, Quebec, or Gulf of St. Lawrence  
A blue-and-white Flag, horizontally divided, N. Brunswick, or Bay of Fundy  
A white-and-blue Pendant—Vessel has an English Mail on board  
A white Pendant—Coasts of Nova-Scotia

#### REPEATS FROM OUT-POSTS AT FORT GEORGE.

For a square rigged vessel—two balls of a size.  
A ship—A large ball at the end of the yard, with a small in the centre.  
A brig—a small ball at the end of the yard, with a large ball in the centre.  
A Lozenge in the centre, close up—a sloop or schooner.

Mitchell & Strachan, do pierced white  
Fiddes & Robertson, red and white flag, red uppermost  
John Brown, a red burgee, centre letter B  
Lepossie & Hall, a yellow and blue flag chequered  
D & E Starr, a red flag.  
C. & W. Roche, a red flag, centre a white diamond  
Thomas Laidlaw, red, white and red flag, horizontally divided.  
J Leishman, red burgee, white cross

BLUE, &c.—J Allison & Co. a blue Burgee  
Samuel Cunard & Co., a blue flag, centre a star  
Wm. Pryor & Co. a blue and white flag, blue uppermost

James Forman, Jun., do with a diagonal white cross  
James H Tidmarsh, a blue flag. William Story, a blue Petre

WHITE, &c.—J & T Williamson, a white flag  
John L Starr & Co. do centre a star  
W. K. Reynolds, burgee with a red cross  
William Stairs, do pierced blue  
J & H Grant, do centre letters G. & S.  
Fairbanks & M'Nab, a white flag crossed blue  
Wm. Strachan, white, red and white do white next the mast  
William Lawson, a white and blue flag crossed  
T & M Tobin, a white and red flag crossed  
Halifax Packet Company, a white, blue, white and red burgee,  
James Oswald, blue, white and red flag, blue uppermost.  
Thomas M. Morris, white flag, blue border and blue square  
J A Berry, white flag, red cross

The above signals are worn at the main. Upon a vessel arriving in sight  
from the light house so wearing her signal, a similar one is hoisted on the  
Telegraph Staff, or at the yard arm of the signal staff at Fort George, with  
a pendant under it, descriptive of the class of vessel she belongs to.
