WIRELESS BRINGING THE YUKON NEARER

Wireless communication between the Northwest and Yukon territories and other parts of the Dominion was officially inaugurated at midnight, December 5th when the first message, signed by Hon. Charles Stewart, minister of the interior, was transmitted from Ottawa to Dawson.

The recent completion of the southernmost terminal at Edmonton opened the way for the inauguration of the new service. The stations at Fort Simpson and Dawson having been already put into operation.

The Canadian Corps of Signals, in co-operation with the North West Territories and Yukon Branch of the department of the interior, installed the wireless apparatus in the four stations specified, namely, Edmonton, Fort Simpson, Dawson, and Fort Reliance.

Work at Reliance, had to be postponed owing to the loss of equipment and supplies with the steamship Lady Kindersley.
