SASKATOON, SASK.—The citizens have decided to build a hospital.

PRESTON, ONT.—Dr. Ochs is preparing to build a fine residence.

SHOAL LAKE, MAN.—The Council will purchase a chemical fire engine.

BERLIN, ONT.—The Western Shoe Co., capital \$40,000, will build a factory here.

EAST TORONTO, ONT.—The Toronto Type Foundry Co. intend building here.

TILSONBURG, ONT.—A by-law has been carried providing \$5,000 for waterworks.

MEAFORD, ONT.—The question of constructing a sewerage system is under consideration.

PETERBORO, ONT.—G. Walter Green intends building two residences on Cedar street.

SYDNEY, N. S.—The Council are considering the building of a bridge over Wentworth creek.

PARIS, ONT.—The Grand Valley Railway Co. will build a stone or cement block passenger station here.

MORRIS, MAN.—On September 10th the ratepayers will vote on a by-law to provide \$7,000 for a gas plant.

INGLIS FALLS, ONT.—R. G. Little is this week taking tenders for repairing the dam at the electric light power house.

LADYSMITH, B. C.—The by-law to borrow \$35,000 for installing an electric light plant was defeated on the 11th inst.

ATWOOD, ONT.—T. G. Ratcliffe, Township Clerk, wants tenders by 15th inst. for reconstruction of the Nicholson drain.

THAMESVILLE, ONT.—The waterworks by-law was voted on Monday last. Result not learned at time of going to press.

KENORA, ONT.—Voting on the by-law to provide \$200,000 for a municipal water power development is taking place to-day.

KAMLOOPS, B. C.—The Council intend to construct a modern sewerage system and are investigating septic tanks.

STRATHCONA, ALTA.—W.H. Martin & Co. have been appointed architects for the completion of the Grandin street school.

WALLACEBURG, ONT.—Contracts are shortly to be let for a new public library, red brick and Roman stone, cost \$10,000.

PRESTON, ONT.—By-laws were carried here on Monday last to establish waterworks and sewerage systems costing \$73,000.

POWASSAN, ONT.—The ratepayers will vote on a by-law September 1st to raise \$2,000 by debentures for erection of town hall.

SOURIS, MAN.—Bids for purchase of \$3,500 5 per cent. debentures will be received by J. W. Breakey up to September 29th.

OAK POINT, N. B.—Tenders for construction of wharf here close at the Department of Public Works, Ottawa, September 29th.

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I.—Tenders are invited up to September 4th for construction of car shop here for Intercolonial Railway.

NORTH BAY, ONT.—Dr. Bell, of Toronto, intends erecting a fine residence here.—The \$10,000 public school debentures have not been sold.

STURGEON FALLS, ONT.—A by-law was carried here last week to bonus the Northern Ontario Smelting & Refining Co. to establish a smelter.

PORT HOPE, ONT.—Engineers for the Northumberland-Durham Power Co. are making surveys of Healey Falls for the development of electric power.

WELLAND, ONT.—Tenders for construction of main sewer will be received by R. Cooper, Chairman Streets & Sidewalks Committee, up to September 4th.

WOODSTOCK, ONT.—A by-law to loan \$25,000 to Canadian Bearings, Limited, to establish a factory here will be submitted to the ratepayers September 12th.

PORT ARTHUR, ONT.—Thomas Hanley, architect, is taking tenders up to Sept. 3rd for erection of a Baptist church. Plans at store of I. L. Matthews.

NORTH VANCOUVER, B. C.—By-laws were carried last week to raise \$25,000 for waterworks purposes and \$50,000 for improvements in the town site.

GEORGETOWN, ONT.—R. W. King has sold the old foundry to a gentleman who intends converting it into a factory for the manufacture of canners' supplies.

WIARTON, ONT.—Bids for construction of septic tank will be received by W. J. Ferguson, Town Clerk, up to September 3rd. Plans by R. McDowall, C. E., Owen Sound.

PARRY SOUND, ONT.—It is said that the C. P. R. will build a line of railway from this place to North Bay.—The Canadian Bank of Commerce will build a fine bank on the old Seguin House lot.

BOGNOR, ONT.—J. M. Thomson will receive tenders up to September 3rd for building two concrete abutments for a bridge over Beaver river at Heathcote. Plans by R. McDowall, C. E.

REGINA, SASK.—Bids wanted by J. K. Hunter, City Clerk, by September 15th for purchase of the following debentures: \$130,000 waterworks; \$50,000 sewerage; \$180,000 local improvements.

ST. MARY'S, ONT.—A. E. Welch has submitted a proposition to the Town Council to construct an electric railway between this place and London. He asks the town to purchase \$40,000 of stock.

REGINA, SASK.—John Woodman, C.E., Winnipeg, has been retained by the Board of Trade to prepare plans for a Union station.—The Council will ask for tenders for construction of a store-house 100 x 62 feet.

MOOSOMIN, SASK.—A by-law will likely be submitted to the ratepayers providing for the issue of \$25,000 of debentures for construction of waterworks system, \$5,000 for town hall, and a smaller sum for granolithic walks.

LETHBRIDGE, ALTA.—The ratepayers have approved of by-laws granting exemption from taxation to a flour mill, guaranteeing bonds for a woolen mill, and ratifying the agreement with the Electric Light Co. to bore for gas.

WATERLOO, ONT.—The ratepayers have sanctioned the following by-laws: \$5,000 for a third storage tank and additional waterworks improvements; \$3,000 for park improvements; \$10,000 loan to Interior Hardwood Furnishing Co.

QU'APPELLE, SASK.—J. R. North is about to build a two-story and basement brick business block.—The ratepayers will vote on a by-law to grant a franchise to the Moore Milling Co. to install an electric light plant for the town.

CENTREVILLE, ONT.—E. F. Hinch, Clerk Township of Camden, wants tenders by September 15 for constructing a steel bridge over the Salmon river, also for moving the east pier back 15 feet and building a 12 ft. wing wall.

LONDON, ONT.—The Grand Trunk Railway propose to make improvements in South London, including the rebuilding of the Cove bridge.—Engineer Moore has submitted to the City Council a report on the available water supply between Springbank and Kilworth.

BRANTFORD, ONT.—The Watrous Engine Works Co. will build a large addition to their main shop.—T. Harry Jones, City Engineer, is taking tenders up to 30th inst. for construction of macadam pavement on Lorne street and about 2,500 lineal feet of concrete kerb.

POKT COLBORNE, ONT.—A by-law granting a fixed assessment to the Great Lakes Portland Cement Co. was carried on the 23rd inst.—A. C. Cross is asking for tenders up to September 6th for erection of a residence on Clarence street, two stories and basement, of concrete and brick.

BATTLEFORD, SASK.—The ratepayers have almost unanimously decided in favor of a waterworks system, cost \$30,000, including provision for a building of sufficient size for an electric light plant. The water will be obtained from the Saskatchewan river. A system of sewerage will likely be installed later.

NEW WESTMINSTER, B. C.—It is understood that the project of the British Columbia Electric Railway Company to build an electric railway from this city to Chilliwack has been postponed until next year.—F. J. Hait & Co. are taking tenders for addition to Mahon block.

GALT, ONT.—Joseph Rigley, Township Clerk of North Dumfries, wants bids by September 8th for roadway construction, including 1,500 cubic yards of excavation.—The Bell Telephone Co. will remodel their system here next year.—Tenders will be invited for heating the fire hall.

PRINCE ALBERT, SASK.—A by-law will likely be submitted to the ratepayers to grant \$25,000 towards a railway and traffic bridge across the Saskatchewan river, to be built by the Canadian Northern Railway.—The directors of the Prince Albert & Hudson's Bay Railway have decided to begin the preliminary survey at once.
