There has during the The Boer Past week been only War.

There has during the Past week been only such adminishing as the British were obliged to do to protect their positions and the lines of communication. All the activity was on the side of the Boers who accordingly made the fighting, with the result that the British were kept on the alert, but not drawn or forced into any considerable engagement. Roberts has been reported, for the last fow days, as ready for the advance on Protoria but so far a drame has been made. The reasons for the dolay in resunning effensive operations continue to be the necessity of clearing the British flanks and rear from mensoe, to safeguard the lines of communication, to accumulate stores in case of an interruption of these lines, and the want of horses. On the other hand the respite has given the Boers time to recover from the confusion into which the surrender of Oronje and the march on Bloemfontein threy are said to have strongly fortified themselves at Kreconskad, where they are prepared to dispute Roberts' advance. Wepener has been the scene of active and continued operations, where General Brabant's forces have been surrounded. The Boers have also been very much in evidence at Elandslagete, at Borshof, where they attempted to capture a convey of General Methuner's and at Mateking, which determined little stronghold still holds out.

Ever since the opening The Filipino of hostilities in South War. Africe, interest in the sanguinary establishment of supremacy in the Philippines has languished. But the work of bloodaled and the squeezing out of the life of an incipient nationality has been going on all the same. The Filipinos have not yet been conquered nor American authority acknowledged. Last week is said to have been one of the bloodiest of the war since the first day's fighting around Manils: Authentic reports show a total of 378 Filipinos killed, 12 officers and 244 men captured, and many more wounded. As the Filipinos entirely lack hospital isolities a great majority of the wounded are likely to die. The week's work will be in the nighborhood of 1000 Filipinos.
