A short time after that there was pressure brought on us again, through the Union no doubt, and we advanced the wages another ten per cent, which makes about 27 per cent advancein all.

I think that was in March. I had a letter from Mr paquette thanking me and saying that everything was satisfactory, and that he would see that everything would go well. In the month of June following, they brought on more trouble. We met at the sun life office one afternoon, and Mr paquette said "Dont give them ten per cent, give them five per cent -- give them something."
