The question of railway transportation costs and the Crow's Nest Agreement was referred by Parliament to a special committee by the motion passed May 4, 1922. Many sittings of the Committee were held and representations made by witnesses from all over the country, on behalf of representatives of the different provinces. The Committee was to consider as to whether or not the Crow's Nest Pass agreement should be further suspended. On or about the 22nd June the Committee met and adopted the report recommending the suspension, the Committee report reading: "Your Committee, therefore, recommends that a suspension of the Crow's Nest Pass agreement for one year from July 6, 1922, with power to the Governor-in-Council to suspend for a further period of one year, if in its judgment the then existing conditions justify the same. and your Committee recomend that suitable legislation be enacted to make effective this recommendation.
