between the present moment and that of 1914. It was necessary, the <u>Faberi</u> thought, to consider not only the moments but also the forces which come into action at definite moments. History today records a power which had not existed in 1914, namely the Fascist <u>imperialism</u> with all its <u>ideal</u> and material <u>elements</u>, with its conservative and its irrevocable intentions. As far as the latest attempt of Britain against Italy is concerned there is one good angle to the question. The German-Italian trade by rail will be further developed. Steps in this direction have already been undertaken. Two years ago, the Italian newspaper <u>Taberi</u> points out, over the eastern and northern passes 8,600,000 pounds were imported.
