The Easter offertory exceeded that of last year by only \$1.33. This was rather disappointing, as we hoped for a considerably larger sum. It will be seen that it leaves us with a deficit of \$92.66, besides which we owe a balance of coal account, and some unexpected bills for repairs to plumbing and repairs to organ amounting altogether to nearly \$150. But we carried forward quite as much, or perhaps more, at Easter of last year, so that if we have not cleared all off, we at any rate have not fallen behind.

The number of Communicants on Easter Day was 477.

At the Mid-day Service the congregation was estimated at 470, being probably the largest number ever present in the Cathedral except on the occasion of the visit of the Archbishop of Canterbury. A change made in the seating of the North Aisle helped materially to accommodate this unusual number.

The Easter offertory was just \$300, besides which there was placed on the Altar a bag of gold sent in by the Women's League \$560. There is more to come in, to be added to this. The amount would have been much greater had it not been that a number of women of the League are discouraged by the delay on the part of the men in doing something. As to this we may observe that there has been some rumour of the fourth crossing pier being taken up whenever its character and probable cost is more definitely ascertained.

The children's offering on Easter Day for Indian Missions was \$44. Their gifts for the pier will not come in at present, as that fund has been delayed this year in order to allow first place to the Indian Missions.

The total amounts given through the offertory on Easter Day was therefore over \$900.

Amongst the Easter gifts to the Cathedral is a beautiful Solid Silver gold-lined box for Communion breads from the members of the Drew family, Brunswick Avenue, in memory of Mrs. Drew who died about two years ago. The box was made by Roden Brothers, Silversmiths, from designs furnished by Canon Macnab. On the lid of the box is a deeply engraved Latin Cross. On the sides and ends are engraved the following inscriptions:

"In loving memory of our Mother, Phyllis M. Drew, June 6th 1905"
"Her Children arise up and call her Blessed." Proverbs xxxi, 28.
