During the past week receipts of livestock at the Union stockyards have been as follows: 6,640 cattle, 158 calves, 8,890 hogs and 2,108 sheep.

Cattle

During the whole of the past week the market has held to its very draggy tone, similar to that expected in last week's market page. Receipts have been heavy on the whole and this, together with the fact that a large proportion of the offerings is unfinished and immature stock, has certainly had no tendency to relieve the present congested state of the market. To add to this state of congestion there were carried over from last week 819 hogs, 29 sheep and 819 cattle. It is extremely unfortunate that so much young immature stock is being sacrificed due to the lack of money and scarcity of feed. It is not the immediate monetary loss due to low prices which is so regretable, but much more important is the fact that this indiscriminate sale will create a condition similar to that which existed previous to the introduction of more livestock into the country. This selling will be felt much more in a year or two's time when no mature stock will be available. Jas. A. Poole, in Chicago the other day, said that in the course of a few months there would be a veritable cattle famine. He said that in the first nine months of the present year deliveries of cattle to American markets had decreased 735,000, and hogs 1,824,000, and went so far as to suggest that the Federal government should use the postal savings deposits to finance thebreeding industry. In the Winnipeg markets during the past week declines of 25 to 50 cents per hundred on all classes of stock have been common, cattle being very hard to move even on the decline. Choice cattle have been noticeable by their absence. Very few have sold at 86.50, the bulk selling around \$5.75 to \$6.00. Good feeders have been selling round \$5.75 to \$6.00. There was a fair offering of sheep and lambs during the past week and prices held reasonably steady. Choice good wethers sold at 6 cents, with the bulk of the good sheep selling around 5 to 5½ cents. Choice lambs are quoted at 6 to 6½ cents.

Little change is reported this week in the produce situation, most of the prices remaining the same. Butter has not changed at all in price, plenty coming into the market to supply the demand. Fancy dairy is worth 23 cents; No. 1 dairy 20 cents, and good round lots 16 to 17 cents.

Eggs

There is a good demand for really fresh eggs which can be relied upon to boil. Fresh eggs on the market are conspicuous by their absence and a premium might be readily received for shipments which were strictly fresh. Egg prices are 20 to 21 cents per dozen.

Potatoes

Potatoes are reaching the local market in good quantities just now and many people are laying in their winter stocks. The price paid is 55 to 60 cents per bushel.

Milk and Cream

There is a one cent raise in the price paid for sour cream, this week's price being 25 cents instead of 24 cents. November milk is quoted at \$2.10 per hundred pounds and sweet cream the same price, namely 30 cents per pound of butterfat.
