A WORLD'S RECORD AT BILLIARDS

In a billiard match of 3,000 up between George Gray, the Australian champion, and Walter Osborne, ex-Midland champion, Gray at Nuneaton, on the afternoon of December 18, made an unfinished break of 600. Resuming in the evening he carried his break to 1,051. This constitutes a world's record with ivory balls. Gray's previous record was 976.

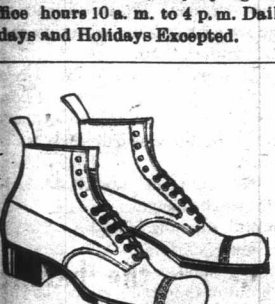
