On December 2nd she fired into and damaged a train on the Ismid railway. On Dec. 3rd she torpedoed and sunk the Turkish destroyer Yar Hissar, outside the Gulf of Ismid. She picked up two officers and forty men of the destroyer's crew and placed them on board a sailing vessel. On Dec. 4th she sank a supply steamer of 3,000 tons and over. At Panderma by gunfire she also destroyed four sailing vessels carrying supplies.
