#### THE BETTER PART OF VALOR.

The party led by Sir Edward Morris are evidently subscribers to the cautious doctrine that "discretion is the

better part of valor." For, after all, the reason, in brief for the appointment of R. A. Squires and S. D. Blandford to the Departments of Justice and Agriculture, with seats in the Legislative Council, is the well-grounded apprehension that two bye-elections would mean two defeats for Government candidates.

The action of the Government in so making these appointments admits the

correctness of this contention. After hearing the bombastic Morris speeches in the House and reading the very disinterested eulogies printed by a subsidised press, we are driven, in the light of these appointments, to the conclusion that the Morris Govern ment (like Falstaff's Soldiers) were afraid of nothing but danger.

#### THEN AND NOW.

Sir Edward Morris issued a most in teresting Manifesto last October. It made certain claims; certain as

sertions; certain promises. As to his promises, the man who can claim that the old ones were fulfilled or the new ones likely to be, has as touching a faith and confidence as Simmon's eldest boy had when he pulled the mule's tail. And his disillusionment may not come just so quickly but it will be just as jarring when it does inevitably come.

Now as to these claims and assertions of Sir Edward in that wonderful collection of fables.

"We put in operation," he says, "a "policy of reducing taxation which re-"turns to the people of the Country the "equivalent of \$400,000 annually.

"A reduction of taxation was ridi "culed by our opponents as wholly im-"possible, but the Government proved "itself able to effect these results and "to remove taxes to the amount of "\$400,000 a year."

That was in October 1913. An election has taken place since then. Si Edward Morris has been returned to power. But not only has his Government replaced this \$400,000 of taxation; they have added close on \$300,-

You see the imminence of an election is very liable to affect the actions and utterances of a political party seeking a new lease or power.

Sir Edward Morris also made a promise in connection with this question of taxation.

"Realising," said he, "that there are "some inequalities in the Tariff which "can be adjusted in such a way as to "lessen the cost of living, and dimin-"ish the burden borne by those least "able to bear it, one of our first tasks "shall be a further revision of the "Tariff in this direction."

That's a promise made in straight, definite terms.

.Sir Edward Morris thereby undertook, if returned to power, to revise the Tariff and revise it downward in such particulars as affected "those "least able to bear the burden of tax-

It was a definite undertaking to reduce the cost of living to the poor

But it was a pre-election pledge. It found its way to the limbo of forgotten campaign promises.

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
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
