THE SITUATION. London hears that Turkey is likely to be the next of the Central Powers to surrender.

French and American forces on the Meuse front continue to make splendid advances and reports from all sources show that the spirit of braggadocio and fight is more and more becoming knocked out of the Hun.

IN ALBANIA also Italian troops are pushing well ahead. They have entered the city of El Bassan, after crushing stubborn Austro-Hungarian resistance.

CANADA'S NEED OF MONEY. A second Victory Loan is now absolutely necessary, even if peace should come at once.

Whether peace comes quickly or not, large advances will have to be made to finance the sale of our products to Great Britain.

Even though peace should come at once, advances would have to be made to the Imperial Munitions Board, whose activities would almost certainly be directed to the work of national reconstruction.

Remember that the war is not yet over and that the money that Canada must finance herself to the end.

The 1917 Victory Loan made possible the advancing of \$100,000,000 to finance the 1917 wheat crop. Another \$100,000,000 was similarly advanced to finance the sale of our exportable surplus of beef and pork products to Great Britain.

A larger war loan is needed this year than last, because the 1918 war expenditure will probably be from \$50,000,000 to \$75,000,000 larger than in 1917.
