MONTANA JUDGE

Arrested on a Charge of Libel

He Claimed That He Had Been Offered a Bribe Four Years Ago.

Special to the Daily Nugget. Butte, Oct. 30.—Wm. Clancy, judge of the Montana state district court, has been arrested charged with criminal libel preferred by D. J. Hennessey, P. A. O'Farrell, editor of the Reveille, was also arrested. The action is the result of an affidavit appearing in the Reveille above the signature of Clancy. It was alleged that Clancy had been offered a bribe four years ago by Hennessey to influence his decision in some litigation then pending between the late Marcus Daly and the Heinz interests. Judge Clancy was released on his own recognizance and O'Farrell was held under bonds of \$1000.

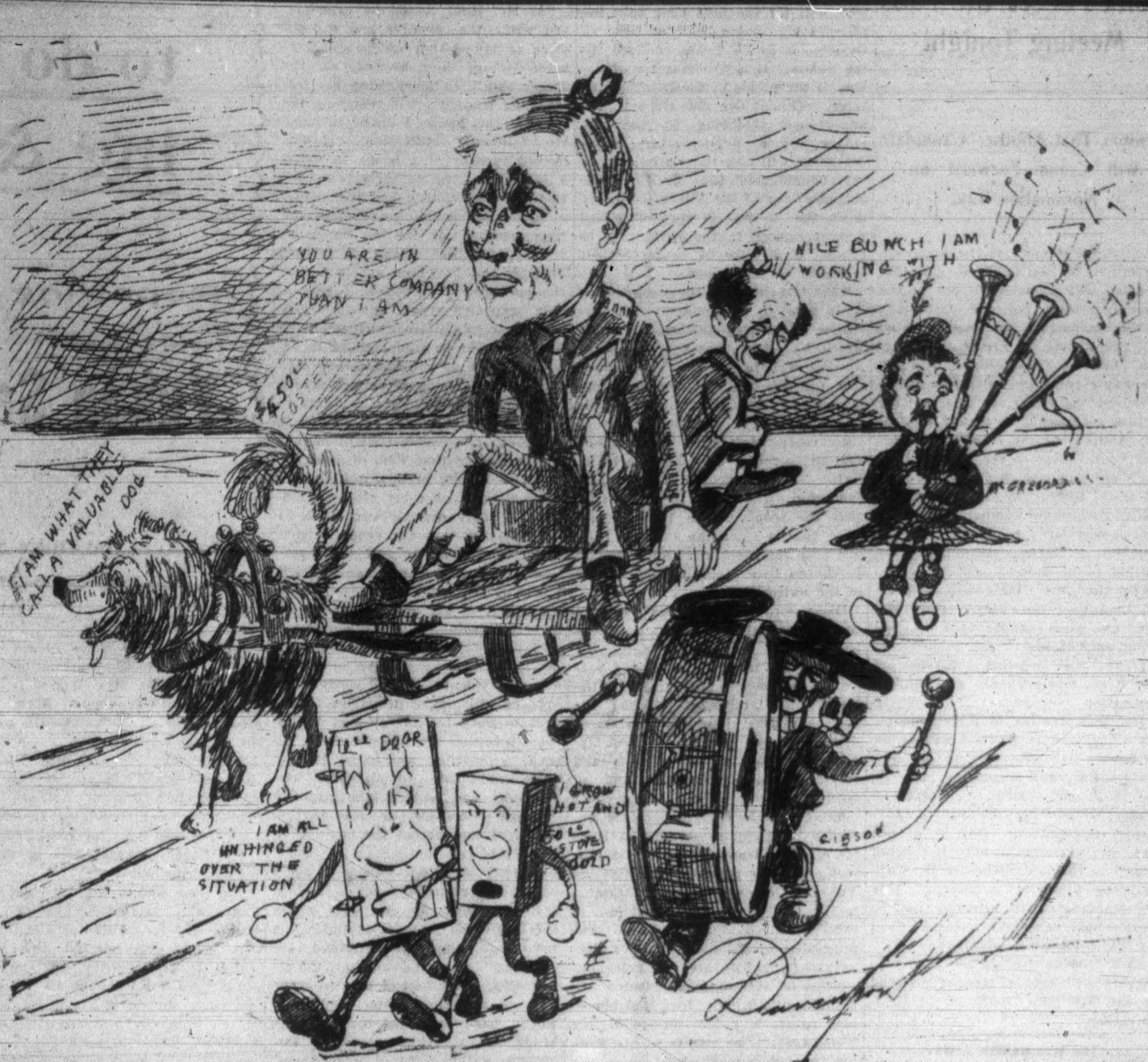

EDWARD LA BELLE ON THE WITNESS STAND

Tells His Story to the Jury While Prisoner Fournier Sits in the Box, an Interested Listener—Alleged Murderer Places All Responsibility Upon Fournier—Has His Dates Well in Hand and Makes a Very Good Showing—Excellent Memory.

Dr. J. H. McArthur yesterday afternoon during his cross-examination by Mr. Hagel was informed by a rifle of large size and the shot must have been inflicted from behind. A rifle, too, on account of the rifling in the barrel which imparts a twirling motion to the bullet and also on account of its increased velocity would produce a more shattering result than a smooth bore gun. There was found on the body a pair of overalls, pants, outside shirt, underclothes, and boots. The clothes at the time were very dirty and full of mud and sand and it was impossible for the witness to identify the clothes offered in evidence. There was a short rope around the left arm above the elbow and also one around the right ankle. The rope presented as an exhibit was in the same condition as when removed from the body. Death from the wound received must have been instantaneous. The age of the deceased was merely a matter of conjecture as there were no features to go by and decomposition had reached an advanced stage. There were a number of abrasions on the skin on the forearm which may have been produced by dragging the body over the stones and rough ground. The body presented a beautiful condition throughout and life was extant before it reached the water. The witness examined the pieces of bone found on Murder Island and gave it as his opinion that they were human bones, one piece being a part of the occipital bone.

Edouard Prioux was the last witness for the crown and from the way in which his testimony was given one received the impression that he knew great deal more of the case than he cared to tell. His evidence was given with much diffidence and he appeared to not care whether he said anything or not. He has known both Fournier and La Belle for two years and knows that they were acquainted as he saw them together last fall here in the city. Does not know what they were doing. Met the accused the latter part of last June or the first of July at the Broadway hotel in South Dawson. La Belle was alone and after some little conversation they came down town together. La Belle and the witness. The latter asked La Belle if he had been outside and he replied that he had only been up the river as far as the Selwyn. He had gone there to stake a piece of ground, but had not done so as it did not suit him. La Belle during the conversation had spoken of Fournier as being a "blood" and a "blooded man," also remarking, "I'll stay with him." La Belle gave lower part of his face being hidden by a thin, bristly, black beard, every hair of which occupied a lot by itself and grew straight out with bravado of independence. Amid the deepest hush Mr. Hagel put the first question to the witness. What was his name? Where he was born? and so on, and La Belle answered in a voice little above a whisper. "How long ago were you born?" "Thirty-seven years." "How long did you live in the province of Quebec?" "Thirty-two years." From this witness answered questions which brought out his history to the time he came to Dawson as follows: "When I left the province of Quebec I went to Nelson, B. C., and lived there a year. I worked for two months in a store, and the rest of the time I worked as a miner in the Silver King mine, five miles from Nelson up the mountain. "I then went to Vancouver and got work in a logging camp. What was the reason I left there? I got hurt in one of my arms and went to Vancouver to see doctors. Then I went to Clearwater, Idaho, and worked on the railroad. I was there all that summer and left to go to Spokane. From there I went to work on the Cascade tunnel, and I stayed there until the tunnel was completed. "The work was too hard for me there and I went to Seattle and got work on the Black Diamond coal mines. I was there about nine months. I left there in April, 1900 and came to this country. "You came to this country?" put in Mr. Hagel. "Yes, sir. I was going to Nome or here and I stopped here. When I got here I heard that Nome was no good, so I staid here. "Mr. Justice Craig at this point said the court room was too cold and he could not stand it any longer. He had taken a cold yesterday. There was a hurry to close the windows tight and to turn on more heat, and everyone in the court room, the jury included, seemed to cough at once, as if they had wanted to do so for some time but were afraid to break the stillness which marked every moment while La Belle had been speaking. "Mr. Hagel, before proceeding, said he had been informed that the reporters heard the testimony with great difficulty, and he would there-

RUNS INTO MONEY

Price of White Star Line \$53,000,000.

Shareholders in Old Company to Receive \$50,000. for Each 1000 Shares Purchased.

New York, Oct. 30.—The purchase price of the White Star line on joining the International Mercantile Marine Co. is \$53,497,180, of which \$15,730,180 is cash, and the balance \$25,174,000 in preference and \$12,587,000 in common stock. Shareholders get over \$50,000 for each 1000 shares.

STEAMER LIGHTNING

Arrived From Whitehorse This Morning

With Heavy Cargo of Freight—News of the River, the La France Coming.

The steamer Lightning arrived from Whitehorse this morning with a cargo of 120 tons of hay, feed and machinery for the White Pass and Yukon Route. The Lightning left Whitehorse on the morning of Monday, the 20th, making the trip down in ten days, which considering the lateness of the season, the low condition of the water and the heavy cargo is extraordinarily good time, and in fact is a record breaker. The river, according to the statement of Purser Robt. Brazil, with the exception of the low State of the water, is in its first class condition for navigation, being practically clear of ice from Dawson to Whitehorse. The side streams are also clear with very little ice flowing from any of them. The Big Salmon was throwing a little ice as was also the Pelly and the Stewart. The White river is closed some distance above but at the mouth it is clear and no ice. From Hootalinqua to Stewart there is no snow on the hills and very little shore ice. The weather is temperate and not uncomfortable. There are plenty of bars in evidence and it was hard pulling for the Lightning over some of them but the fact that she was successful in so doing is attested by her arrival in Dawson. As soon as her cargo is discharged she will be taken to winter quarters in the slough. The intrepid light draught steamer La France is due to arrive from Whitehorse Saturday morning and will leave on the return trip on Saturday afternoon. The Nugget's facilities for turning out first-class job work cannot be over-estimated this side of San Francisco.
