Useful Recipes

(Exchange)

Beets with Horseradish.—Boil 12 beets, peel them and pack in sterilized jars. Heat 1 quart of vinegar with 1 teaspoon ginger and 1 teaspoon of mace, strain then add 2 tablespoons grated horseradish. Pour over the beets when boiling hot and seal at once.

Canned Beets.—Use very young tender beets. Soak in cold water and peel. Put them into hot fruit jars, then fill the jars with boiling salted water. Put on the rubbers and glass tops and steam for one hour, then screw down the sterilized tops and boil 15 minutes longer. Unless very young beets are used cut them in slices.

Damson Cheese.—Remove the stalk and put the fruit into a large jar or stewpan. Cover closely, cook in a very slow oven until perfectly soft, then rub through a fine sieve. Measure the pulp, and put it into a preserving-pan with twelve to sixteen ounces of sugar according to individual taste. Boil until the greater part of the syrup has evaporated and the pulp has become very stiff, stirring frequently at first and almost continuously towards the end of the process. Turn into small jars. If liked, the stones may be cracked and kernels added to the puree with the sugar.

Sponge Pudding.—Scald one pint of milk over boiling water and add one-half cup butter. Add a smooth thickening of one cup of flour mixed with cold milk. Let it cool. When cold add the yolks of four eggs; have the whites beaten stiff, and stir in lightly. Bake an hour in a pan of water.

Damson Pudding.—Take six ounces of suet, free it from skin, shred and chop it finely. Mix well together with three ounces of bread crumbs, one heaped teaspoon of baking powder and quarter of a teaspoon of salt. Add water to make a paste soft enough to roll easily, but not so moist as to stick to board or rolling pin, about one-third of a pint of water. Line a basin with the paste and half fill it with damsons, add sugar to taste. Put on the cover of paste and carefully seal the edges. If the pudding is to be boiled tie on a scalded well-floured cloth; if steamed, cover with a sheet of greased paper. Cook from two and a half to three hours. The paste used for this pudding is exceedingly light and easily digested, but in consequence of its extreme lightness is liable to break if turned out of the basin.
