It was evident from the small volume of business on the street market here to-day that the farmers were paying a good deal of attention to the question of the referendum. Offerings of grain and hay were light and there was little or no business in the other lines of produce. The total offerings of grain were 1,200 bushels.

Wheat—Three hundred bushels of white sold 1c lower at 69c to 70c, 200 bushels of red unchanged at 70c and 200 bushels of goose ½c higher at 64½c.

Barley—Maiting sold 1c higher at 44c to 48c and feed unchanged at 42c to 44c. Deliveries were only 500 bushels.

Hay—Timothy was dearer, selling \$1 higher at \$13 to \$15 per ton. Clover or mixed sold \$1 lower at \$6 to \$9 per ton. Receipts were only eight loads. No straw was offered.

Dressed Hogs—Offerings continue heavy

Toronto Live Stock.

Toronto Live Stock.

There was no business in export cattle at the local market to-day, but other lines were fairly active. The receipts were light, thanks to the instructions sent to country points by dealers here, and the blockade was not a very serious one. There was a good demand for choice cattle for the local butchers' trade, and some lots of exporters were sold to kill. Feeders were steady and there was a fair movement in stockers. Bulls were quiet but steady, and milch cows were firm. Sheep were practically unsalable, but lambs were steady. Calves and hogs were unchanged. The total run was 50 loads, including 727 cattle, 630 sheep and lambs, 12 calves and 138 hogs.

Export Cattle—The situation with regard to the New England embargo is unchanged, and the trade in shipping cattle is at a standstill. Dealers in the country seem to have realized that it would be useless to send in their shipments and the offerings were very small. For those that came in there was little or no demand. A few lots were sold to local butchers, and these were the only cattle which changed hands. Prices paid were much lower than the current nominal quotation for export cattle. Buyers declared that the loads which came in to be sold as exporters would be sent back to the country. There are enough cattle here to fill the space which it is expected will be available within the next few days, and no more are wanted. Prices are purely nominal and no one is prepared to quote values.

Butchers' Cattle—The market for choice

Feeders and Stockers—The call for short-keep and other heavy weights is well maintained, but the offerfacts are firm and others are steady, with no change. Stockers are steady, and unchanged, with a good demand.

Colored Inks in Tattooing

In an article on the subject of tatooing, in Pearson's, the marvellous results obtained by an English ex-

pert are thus described: Until comparatively recently only two colors, indigo blue (or India ink black) and red were used in tattoo ing, but a Japanese increased number by discovering a permanent brown, and Sutherland Macdonald has now added four more to the list, so that he works with no fewer than seven colors altogether. The difficulty has been to get a color that will hold; any color can be pricked into the human skin, but those made from minerals will all set up, sooner or later, a state of inflammation of the skin and the color will be forced out again, leaving only an uglv scar to

mark the spot. "But by careful experiments on his own body, experiments which have been going on for years now, he has been able to produce a very beautiful green, a permanent ultramarine blue and most difficult of all, a rich yellow, all not only perfectly harmless to the most delicate skin, but colors that will hold, and by blending some of these together he is able to produce brilliant effects, which to the uninitiated would appear to be altogether impossible.

"Tattooing in so many colors, with all their graduations of shading, is a lengthy process-Mr. Macdonald will spend a matter of 60 to 70 hours in completing a design to cover a man's chest-not at a stretch, of course. but working two or three hours day for 20 or 30 days."


