Then the honors and emoluments were fairly divided, but since the grafter parliamentarian has developed he "hogs" everything in sight. He must have his election expenses paid, others do the work of electioneering for him, his sessional indemnity increased, and when beaten retired into the Senate or some good fat office, if he had not gotten there before that event. The "grafter" should be taught that the people who support him aren't fools-all the time.

"DON" ON THE SCHOOL BOOK QUESTION.

The attitude of W. A. Kribs on the school book monopoly is thus referred to by "Don" in Saturday Night:

"In looking over the propositions which various members are representing, I noticed one by Mr. Kribs, of South Waterloo, which sounds promising. He has a bill for the publication and sale of school books by the Government, which would do away with many limitations which both the Department of Education and the public find costly and embarrassing. Of course this will receive the bitter opposition of the publishers who now have what is practically an exclusive right to make and vend these necessary books. I confess that I have never been able to understand the attitude of the Government on this question. The original plates were prepared and the books practically edited by experts employed by the Government. They are very good, but, being without competitors, have grown bet we thou competitors, have grown bethave not been perceptible. While the price of paper has decreased enormously, the price of books has not diminished in proportion. There is no risk attending their sale, for a bookseller must pay the same as cash or not get them. Enormous profits admittedly have been made by those who got a place in the combine which has controlled educational works. Publishers have not been to blame for getting all they could, and while the Government's mistake may have been made at the beginning of the scheme, I am not convinced that the present condition of affairs has been maintained without the Government's knowledge that they could greatly reduce the price of the books if they were published and handled, we will say, by the King's Printer. It is too soon to predict either success or failure of Mr. Kribs' bill, but as the penefits of public ownership are beginning to dawn upon the Government it is to be hoped that there will be a radical change in the present school


