LINK WITH THE PAST.

Ancient Monastery Once Used by Buccaneers, Now a Store.

An ancient monastery now used as greengrocer's is one of the curiosi-es of Poole, in Dorset. To be preties of Poole, in Dorset. To be precise, only a part remains—a long, low, buttressed building on the quay variously called the Town Cellar or Wool House. Each appellation is significant of the uses to which it has been put since the disestablishment of the monastery.

The fate of the building has some counterpart in the history of the place itself. When its near neighbor, Bournemouth, was but a collection of rude huts, Poole was a port of importance. By 1224 an embargo laid by Henry III. on all vessels lying in the port of Poole, among others,
