



CASTLE IN THE AIR.

Wembley Tower, Which Was to Have Reached 1,150 Feet, Demolished.

Reached 1,150 Feet, Demolished.

The most prominent landmark in Middlesex—Wembley Tower— is now being demolished, and will be cleared entirely away in about a year.

It was intended to be the tallest tower in the world, the full height being planned 1,150 feet, as against the 985 of the Paris Eiffel tower. The promoter of the scheme was Sir Edward Wakkin, who hoped to make a more attractive pleasure resort at Wembley than either Earl's Court or Crystal Palace. A premium was offered for designs, and 500 guineas was awarded to three architects jointly.

The base of the tower covers 90,000 feet of ground, and the size of the first platform—which was as far skywards as the tower ever reached — may be judged from the fact that it was to accommodate a theatre to seat 1,500

persons!

The erection of the tower was begun in 1893, and stopped in August, 1894, the main reason being that there was a lack of funds, although a remark of Lord Roeebery's, to the effect that the building was a "new Tower of Babel," is supposed to have given offence to Sir Edward Watkin, and to have had something to do with the abandonment.
