RUSSIANS RETIRING

Tokio, Oct. 13.—1 p. m.—It is reported that the Russians are retiring along the entire front and the Russian force at Penhsu is probably enveloped. Eight more guns have been captured by the Japanese.

Mukden, Oct. 13.—The battle south of this place continued throughout Wednesday with ever increasing fury. In respect of desperation, bravery and bloodshed it far exceeds even the battle of Liao Yang.

Towards evening the Japanese repeatedly assumed the offensive. The fight continues to-day with unabated fury and determination. It is now the fourth day of the battle.

LIFE OF A BATTLESHIP.

A modern battleship costs probably ten times what a Constitution or a Victory cost a century ago, yet its life of actual usefulness, even barring destruction in a sea fight, is comparatively brief. So rapid are the advances in the science of naval architecture and armament that within ten years of her launching a Massachusetts or an Oregon has become a relic of the past, and is doomed to speedy oblivion in the junk yard.—Pittsburgh Dispatch.

GOOD MEETING

Excellent Rally at Coatsworth—Much Comment on the Stephens Bribery Charges.

Coatsworth, Oct. 12.—Prospects never were brighter in the Township of Romney for the Liberal-Conservative party than at the present time. The meeting in the interest of H. S. Clements, held here last evening, was largely attended, and for over two hours those present listened intently to the speech by the Conservative candidate, who spoke most ably on the tariff question, and an address by Dr. W. A. Thornton on the matters occupying the attention of the electors at the present time.

The charges preferred against Geo. Stephens for attempting to bribe two members of the Dover Council have created a great deal of talk here, and all are waiting patiently for his proof that they are not true. In the meantime they can only draw conclusions one way.

CATTLE MARKETS.
Cables Firmer—Montreal Market Flooded With Supplies.

London, Oct. 12.—Cattle are firmer at 8 1/2c to 12 1/2c per lb.; refrigerator beef, 9 1/2c to 11c per lb. Sheep, 10 1/2c to 11 1/2c, dressed weight.

MONTREAL LIVE STOCK.
Montreal, Oct. 12.—About 1200 head of butchers' cattle, 25 milch cows, 50 calves, 200 sheep and lambs and 1000 fat hogs were offered for sale at the East End Abattoir to-day. The cattle market was glutted, and the butchers having bought large supplies on Monday, did not need many cattle to-day, and bought sparingly. Prime beefs sold at 4c to 4 1/2c; good mediums, 3 1/2c to 3 3/4c; ordinary mediums, 3c to 3 1/2c; the common stock, 2c to 3c, and the small bulls and lean cows, 1 1/2c to 2c per lb. The calves were mostly grassers, and some of them rather lean in flesh. These sold at 2c to 3c per lb., while good hogs sold at 4c to 5c per lb. Milch cows sold at 2 1/2c to 3 1/2c each. Shipping sheep are 8 1/2c, and the others 2 1/2c to 3 1/2c per lb. Lambs sold at 3 1/2c to 4 1/2c per lb. Fat hogs sold at about 4 1/2c per lb. for heavy fat, 5c per lb. for lights, and from 5 1/2c to 5 3/4c per lb. for select. Most select are sold at Point St. Charles, where large packing houses are located.
