THE SOUTH

makes one feel like going for a drive
right away. We spent a day at
Mongolia, where some of the party
amused themselves catching oys-
ters.

"New Orleans was the next place
visited, where we stopped at the New
St. Charles, one of the finest hotels
of the South. We spent two days in
sight-seeing in this beautiful city.

The cemeteries and parks there
are well worth visiting. They are
profuse with palms and shade trees
of all descriptions. We spent one
day in the French district, where
we saw the old Royal Hotel, famous
in American history. We were
here shown the block on which the
slaves were auctioned off in years
gone by. The name of the auction-
eer still remains above the clock. We
also spent some time in the shipping
district, where cotton, sugar and
corn were being transferred from
railways to boats for transportation.

"Mr. John Wilmont, a Canadian,
who lives down there, put a fine
house boat at our service for a day,
when we enjoyed a sail down the
Mississippi. On our way down we
stopped off at a plantation where
the sugar and syrup were being
extracted from the cane. We
were told that one barrel of this
sugar, when refined, equals five
barrels of granulated sugar.

"On our return to New Orleans, we
started on our homeward trip over
the Queen and Crescent R. R. to
Chattanooga, where we were again
banqueted at one of the large ho-
tels. This hotel is situated on the
heights, 2,300 feet above the sea level,
and is reached by means of an in-
cline railway. In Chattanooga at the
time of our visit there was about
eight inches of snow on the ground.

"We then proceeded to Cincinnati,
where we spent an enjoyable day vi-
siting the principal places of interest.
The parks and the Zoo are among
the main features of this place.

Leaving Cincinnati at 10 p. m., we ar-
rived in Detroit next morning at
nine, where we had breakfast and
disembarked.

"The outing proved highly instruc-
tive to us, as well as pleasant and
interesting. We were met at the
terminus of each railway by the of-
ficials of the next over whose road
we were to travel. These officials in-
structed us regarding the principal
points of interest along their route,
giving us schedules as to time of rail-
way, steamship connection, etc. This
was done so that we may be able
to direct our passengers, should any
of them desire to take in this de-
lightful trip. Hotel rates compare
favorably with the rates of hotels in
this country, with the exception of
the larger hotels, where the rates
are somewhat higher. All appear to
be doing a very large business."

Mr. Fremlin brought home with
him a large number of souvenirs of
his trip, among which was a live
alligator about a foot long. He says
that the association were tendered
the most hospitable and courteous
treatment, and that at every stop
a band was present and played "God
Save the King," in honor of the vis-
itors.

Mrs. Fremlin accompanied her hus-

the outing very much and returned
in good health.
