—Messrs McLean & Blaikie, of Great Village, are about completing a fine large four-masted ship at that place.

—The bark "Moselle" recently sailed from Charlottetown for Liverpool, Eng. with 2,857 cases of canned lobsters.

—Reports from Parboro say the apples coming from this side to their markets are the best that ever came at this time in the season.

—The sawmill and box-factory at Hammond's Plains was completely destroyed by fire on Saturday the 12th inst. Loss over \$8,000; no insurance.

—The famous comedian, John Murphy, is to appear in Halifax again in October in his comedy Keny Glow, which has been played by him for some years.

THE SALVATION ARMY.—Capt Kemble, advance guard of the Salvation Army, arrived from St. John on Wednesday to make a reconnaissance. The army will attack Yarmouth about a month from now. A hall to be used as barracks will be hired and the fight will be sustained for one year at least. The captain's uniform attracted no little attention on the streets and at the hotel.—Yarmouth Times.

A shocking accident occurred at Pictou on Saturday last resulting in the instantaneous death of Sergeant William Dey, one of the best known men in the town. As far as known, Mr. Dey was preparing a gun in his dwelling house, at which work he was quite an expert, and having the muzzle close to his mouth, the contents of the load—wesson in some mysterious manner exploded, and entering the mouth penetrated clean through the head, a large hole being pierced in the skull. The report of the rifle called his wife to the scene of the terrible accident, who arrived in time only to see her husband writhing in the agonies of death. Dey was fifty-one years of age and a veteran soldier, having served twenty-five years in the British army. Besides his wife he leaves a married daughter, who resides in Truro.
