METH. CONFERENCE

MORNING SESSION—FRIDAY.

The session opened with singing hymn 57, after which Rev. Charles Lench led in prayer. Minutes of previous session were read and adopted. Communications were read by Secretary of Conference.

At 10 o'clock the order of day was the election of Board of Governors for the Methodist College, St. John's.

The Conference then balloted for its representatives to the General Board of Missions. Rev. Dr. Saint was elected Ministerial representative, and Mr. Arthur Mews, C.M.G., Lay representative.

NOON.

Prof. Shaw, M.A., of Pine Hill, Halifax, addressed the Conference. Subject: The War's Demand on the Church. The Professor took for today's discussion the end of the war. This thought centers around the returning soldiers. Those at the front, many of them, have no connection with a church, but they are living under Christian conditions—self-denial and sacrifice. When they come back they will not be influenced by dogma and creed, but will think of religion in terms of life. He spoke in a clear and forceful manner of the present need of the spirit of brotherhood in the church, and the real call to the church today is to come near the cross, with a full understanding of the meaning of the cross. The soldier has learnt afresh the meaning of the cross; we at home must also learn afresh the meaning of the cross. We must not divide Christ, but present the full Gospel of the cross. The church has been guilty of presenting the Gospel in too low a fashion. We should appeal to the heroic in men. The demand today is for the soldier quality of religion, the spirit of sacrifice.

AFTERNOON.

The afternoon session was given up to the hearing of addresses from the representatives of the Colleges. Dr. Smythe, of Wesley College, Montreal, and Dr. Deland, of Mount Allison University, each presented a report of his own College in a very masterful manner, and we all feel the Methodist Church was honored to have such men in educational institutions.

Rev. Dr. Moore, Secretary of the General Conference, and at the head of Social Service and Evangelism, then came to the platform and delighted the Conference with his stirring address of the work carried on under his department, and the great work still to be accomplished.

The following resolution was then presented and carried:

WHEREAS, the Rev. N. M. Guy severs his connection this year with this Conference to take up work in another land and Conference;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that this Conference place on record its deep sense of loss in Bro. Guy's departure, and its sincere prayer that God's blessing be with him and Mrs. Guy during their journey, and remain with them in their new home.

Many brethren spoke in support of the resolution, and Rev. Mr. Guy fittingly replied.

The Conference also passed this resolution:

RESOLVED, that the members of the Conference have learned with sincere regret that Bro. Frederick Matthews has been transferred from the Nfld. Conference to Montreal Conference, and in taking leave of him desire to place on record their high appreciation of Bro. Matthews and his work. We beg to assure Brother Matthews that he takes with him the prayers and best wishes of his brethren and friends. We take this opportunity of expressing our common feeling that in his departure our Conference loses an able minister of Jesus Christ and a brother not beloved only but also highly gifted in Evangelistic fervour and enthusiasm. Rev. Canon Smith Seriously Ill

We regret very much to learn that Rev. Canon Smith is seriously ill, and it is feared he will not be able to attend Synod this year. He has been present at every session of the Synod since its formation. To-day is the forty-seventh anniversary of his ordination to the Priesthood, to which he was advanced in 1871. Two years previous to that date he was ordained deacon, so that now he enters his fiftieth year in Holy Orders. He was ordained Priest by the late Bishop Field, assisted by Rural Deans J. C. Harvey, Thos. Boone, and A. E. C. Bayley and by Rev. Dr. Herbert Mather, Bishop's Chaplain. All of these with the exception of Dr. Mather have now entered into rest. Dr. Mather after having for some years been Bishop of Antigua is now retired in England. We hope Canon Smith will be spared to spend his Golden Jubilee with us, and that his health will improve rapidly.

Law Governing Traffic Will Be Strictly Enforced

Inspector General of Police Hutchings was the complainant this morning in the prosecutions against a cabman and truck driver for a breach of the new regulations covering traffic along certain streets and the stopping of vehicles where street-cars cross for the purpose of allowing the public to make transfers with safety. Mr. Higgins, K.C., appeared for both defendants and made a strong plea for leniency. In both cases he assured the court that there was no intention to violate the law. Judge Morris having heard Inspector General Hutchings, who agreed that as this was the first prosecution a light fine would suffice, fined the parties \$1.00 each. But Mr. Hutchings made it clear that in all future cases for a breach of this particular regulation he would press for the full penalty. The Judge thoroughly concurred with the Inspector General, remarking that the time was now come that the drivers of all vehicles, whether they be trucks, victorias or motor cars should be taught to respect the rights of pedestrians, who under all circumstances have first right to the use of the city streets. The public were entitled to protection as well as to the free use of the city thoroughfares, and he would see to it that these rights were protected and enforced.

To-morrow at the Kirk

The Presbyterians of St. John's will have the opportunity of hearing one of Canada's most talented preachers at St. Andrew's Church to-morrow. Rev. Prof. Falconer is well-known throughout the city, and like his talented brother, Sir Robert Falconer, President of Toronto University, has done much to further patriotic work. St. Andrew's people will also have the privilege of hearing Prof. Shaw, another member of the Faculty of the Halifax Presbyterian College. All the other professors of this institution are at the front on active service.

The Rev. J. D. Savin was ordained Priest at the R. C. Cathedral by His Grace the Most Rev. E. P. Roche, this morning, and will celebrate his first mass at St. Joseph's, Hoytestown, to-morrow at 10 o'clock.

The matter of using intoxicating liquor in Sacramental Services came up, and Dr. Moore made the statement "That intoxicating liquor was not used in any Methodist Church for Sacramental purposes from the Atlantic to the Pacific."

So much time was taken up with the report that no time was left for Dr. Moore to make his address.

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REGISTRATION of BIRTHS

--- in ---

CITY OF ST. JOHN'S

Whereas the Government of this Dominion and the Municipal Council of the City of St. John's have arranged for the engagement of a Community Nurse for service in the said city during the next three months, especially with reference to the saving of infant life;

And Whereas it is necessary that such Nurse should get at once into touch with all newly born infants and their mothers;

On recommendation of the Acting Medical Health Officer, it is ordered that in respect of the City of St. John's Consolidated Statutes, as amended by the provisions of Section 8, Cap. 28, Section 4, Cap. 9, 1899, will be enforced. This Act provides that when any nurse takes charge of information of the same shall be furnished or posted within forty-eight hours thereafter to the proper officer appointed to receive the same, under a fine not exceeding \$10 for every neglect to do so.

The obligation to furnish such information rests in the first instance upon the father of the child; or, in the case of his death or absence, upon the mother; or, in the case of the inability of both parents, then successively upon any person standing in their place, the nurse in attendance, or the occupier of the house within which the births occurs.

As the office of the Registrar General is situated in St. John's, it is ordered that the notification of all births in the City of St. John's from 1st July next, shall be furnished or posted within forty-eight hours thereafter to the Registrar General of Births, Marriages and Deaths, 268 Duckworth Street, upon cards which may be procured from any Post Office or Postal Telegraph Office in the City. Such cards when filled in and signed may be mailed free of charge.

It is not intended that the notification of births as set forth above shall interfere with the reporting of births for registration at present carried out by the Clergymen, who will still continue such registration, transmitting a correct copy of the same to the Registrar General as usual.
