Fears of an Ocean Disaster. VINEYARD HAVEN, Mass., June 25 .- For several days there have been evidences of some ocean disaster in the washing ashore on these islands of wrendrage. Yesterday, a bundle of woman's clothine, evidently done up in grea: haste, was ploked up on the beach as Edgartown. A life preserver that some from the steamer City of Rome was also found. At Smith's Point, gild mouldings, a large door, etc., evidently belonging to some steamer, and also some of the steamer Victoria's bills of lading were washed ashore.
