

TITANIC BATTLE FOR FUR CONTROL

Dawson, Y. T., April 19.—Constables Wm. A. Campbell and Brooker, who arrived here with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police expedition from Herschel Island and Fort McPherson on the Arctic coast, bring the first advices from the vast region on the topmost end of the world since last summer. They report a titanic battle for control of the fur trade in the vast McKenzie valley between the Hudson's Bay Company and the new American firm of Lamson and Hubbard, who are cutting prices of commodities and raising offers on furs in order to get established. foraged ahead of the others and beat them to Banks Land, where there had been no ship for two years, and scored a big scoop, buying up two years' fur catch. Constable Campbell reports meeting Jukro Wada, noted Arctic Japanese gold discoverer and stamper, who was outfitted in New York last year. He made an expedition down the Mackenzie last year, and is now exploring for lost gold mines reported to exist on the Arctic slope south from Herschel. He was last seen en route there last fall.

PULPWOOD FROM LABRADOR NOW

Ottawa, April 26.—A million and a half acres of pulpwood forests in southern Labrador immediately north of Cape St. Charles in Newfoundland territory is being acquired by a United States securities firm to supply the British trade.

Details of the deal are not yet available, but it is understood that full survey of the area has been made by means of photographs from an airplane and the corporation has practically completed its arrangements to take over the forests, install machinery and prepare to ship pulp direct from its own harbors to Great Britain, where the pulp will be converted into paper.

The Knights of Faith

As he spoke, the two wings of the Spanish host, consisting of the Knights of Calatrava on the one side and of Santiago on the other, came swooping swiftly down the valley, while the main body followed more slowly behind. Five hundred paces from the English the two great bodies of horse crossed each other, and, swooping round in a curve, retired in feigned confusion towards their centre. 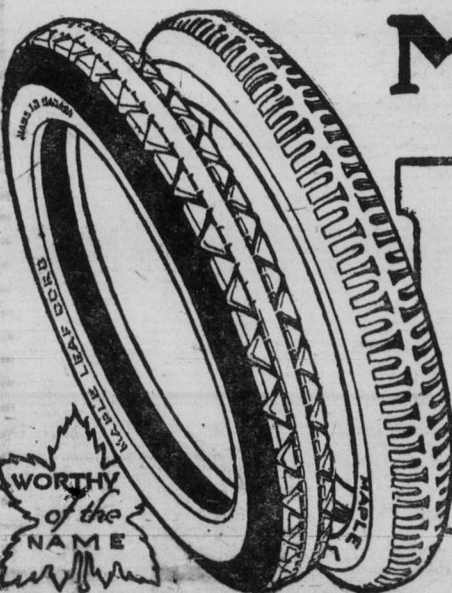
