DECEASED HAD LIVED IN DUNDAS FOR 55 YEARS.

Dundas, Nov. 7.—The funeral of the late Wm. Barry took place yesterday morning and was largely attended. Requiem high mass was celebrated by Rev. Agr. Heenan, who also conducted the services in St. Augustine's Cemetery. The pall-bearers were Wm. Lamb, James Gougeon, Patrick Enright, John Keenan, John Murray and G. G. Jones. Deceased was born in Ireland, and came to Canada with his mother and two brothers in 1852, and has been a resident ever since. His brothers went to Canada soon after their arrival. In his youth he learned the trade of a blacksmith with the old firm of Taylor & Wood, carriage builders, along with Thomas Wilkie, James Gougeon, Wm. Greig, of Greenville, William Cheyne and many others, who became well-known citizens of this vicinity. He was for a long time an employee of the late James Scott, in the implement trade and subsequently with John Forsythe, the peritran company and others. He was a mechanic of greater than ordinary skill. He retired from active work about ten years ago. He was married in 1862 to Miss Catherine Kelly, who came from Ireland a short time previous to his coming. He was a kind man and a nearly well-wisher to all with whom he came in contact and enjoyed in a high degree the esteem of the entire community.
