Will Come Up For Sentence on Friday Next.

David Irvine was tried at the Criminal Court by Judge Monck this morning, on the charge of assaulting Mr. Fred Por-teous on July 18 last, in company with Mark Tompkins, who was recently sen tenced to ten years penitentiary for the offence. He pleaded not guilty and elected to be tried at once.

Mr.' Porteous swore that he had \$350 on his person when going home about 12.15 Sunday morning, and when going into his home was struck with a scant ling and again with a billy. He could in the dark two men. He was knocked down and slugged severai times. The assailants, however, ran when he yelled, and attempted to make theire scape. They ran to Napier street. He ran after them. Irvine, he swore, faced him for a moment and then ran north while he followed Tompkins. He said the prisoner was the man, as he saw him clearly in the light and later identified him in Brantiord from two others without be-ing told who he was. He swore that no shadow was cast upon the prisoner by trees or any other obstacle between him and the light. ed down and slugged several times. The and the light.

Being cross-examined by Mr. A. M. Lewis witness said he could not identify Define cross-examined by al. A. A. Lewis witness said he could not identify him in the alleyway, nor had any im-pressions by which he could do so until he saw him in the light. He had been talking to two men just before he step-pe. into his gate, and the instant he stepped into the gate he was struck. He called after being struck three times, about one-half minute after being first struck. In the police court when asked about the other fellow he gave a des-cription of the man's size and clothing, but said nothing about his features or complexion. At that time he told all he was asked about him. Mr. Lewis asked if he knew anything about prisoner's if he knew anything about prisoner's features at that time, he said he wasn't asked to describe his features. Mr. Lewis asked to describe his features. Mr. Lewis then produced the police court evidence to show that the witness had admitted not knowing anything about the pri-soner's features, and that he said the prisoner was in the shadow of a tree and could not be distinctly seen when he saw him. He was shown a photograph of Irvine, but couldn't say whether it was defore he went to Brantford or not, but didn't belive he had seen it un-til after he had seen him there. He heard of the crime on Sunday morning, and admitted hav-ing told Porteous he saw the men to-gether the day before. John Ira Flatt, being called, said he had measured the electric lights on the corner of York and Napier, and found there could be no shadow to obstruct the view of a man placed in such a position as Portedus described. He exit he cavid

view of a man placed in such a position as Portedus described. He said he could identify any man there standing in a favorable position.

Mr. Lewis then recalled Porteous and asked him if he hadn't admitted to sev-eral individuals that he couldn't identi-fy the prisoner, but the witness said he didn't remember telling any man he couldn't identify the prisoner. He said he was advised not to tell reporters too much.

The crown's case was concluded by calling Chief Smith, and Mr. McHaffie,

After he had gone about half a block, he heard Portcous calling for help. He returned and saw two forms crossing Napier street, but couldn't identify them. He said he was as close to them as Portcous, and he saw four men in all. He knew Irvine, but in the dark could not identify any man.

Walter S. Clark was with Mr. Me-Laughlin, and also said there were three others beside Tompkins, and in parting the men stopped and hesitated for a moment, in deciding which way to go.




