The largest producer is a gentiemaa of Ravip cultivation, including five, whith are this year not in'bearing. He'lias'alvendy sent to market this season 35,400 baskets, countifig in '2,600 quart boxes, equal to four baskets each. This quantity is estimated at gae-third of the whole crop. Should 100,000 baskets be received and tin average of 41 cents per baillet be tealized, the lamount of sales 'from this single cultivator would be between' sis 000 and $\$ 6,000$, move than 'one Half of which sham may 'be put ${ }^{3}$ down dis het profit.
