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Old-Time Wind Mill On The Miramichi Is Recalled

Oatmeal was Scarce on the North Shore in the Old Days—Enterprise of Millers in the Days Before Steam Power is Commended.

The following dated Miramichi, N. B., January 15, 1828, gives an idea of the primitiveness of the mill business before the days of steam and improved machinery. The letter is from the Recorder of the month of January of the above year.

"We have lately had frequent opportunities of 'inspecting Mr. Manderson' Mill, near the Scotch Church, and while we congratulate the settlement on so valuable an acquisition we must confess that we have seldom, if ever seen a more gratifying proof of what industry and perseverance can accomplish, when combined with skill and a commendable spirit of enterprise. Our limits will not permit us to give a minute description of the principle upon which the mill is constructed and as a partial description would not satisfy the curious, we shall therefore merely observe that it is a horizontal wind-mill, but differing materially, as far as we are able to judge, from those which go by the same name in England. In New York, there are two, from one of which Mr. Manderson states he took the hint for his own. When completed it will have 24 sails, and its power will be equal to 14 horses, and sufficient to drive two pair stones and two saws. At present it has but one pair of stones. The principal advantages of this mill we take to be these: that it is free from the objections to which all water mills in this country are more or less subject, as it can be kept at work at all seasons, and does not require more than a light breeze of wind, and that it is accessible to all parts of the river to Napan, to both branches and to the numerous settlements about the bay, and we may add around the coast: for there is no other mill within the reach of these places that can be always depended on. But it is deserving of attention in a point of view distinct from the benefits which it promises to our own agriculturists. The scarcity of mills in Prince Edward Island causes a large export of grain annually to Miramichi principally oats. Yet cheap as oatmeal is as an article of food, it is scarcely ever heard of in Miramichi, simply because we have not had the means of manufacturing it within ourselves. The facilities therefore which the mill will afford for the bringing into market a constant supply of this nutritious food will no doubt lead to its being extensively used, and consequently to an improvement of our intercourse with Prince Edward Island and other neighboring settlements. We had almost forgotten to say that the advantages of the sails of this mill over the vertical one are very great. The latter always require to be adjusted on every change of wind—the horizontal ones adjust themselves; the vertical mill by the difficulty of stopping them in a sudden gale of wind; with the horizontal sails there is no such risk to fear as by a contrivance as simple as it is effectual the sails are so acted upon by weights, that they subvert a smaller angle of the wind as the gale increases."

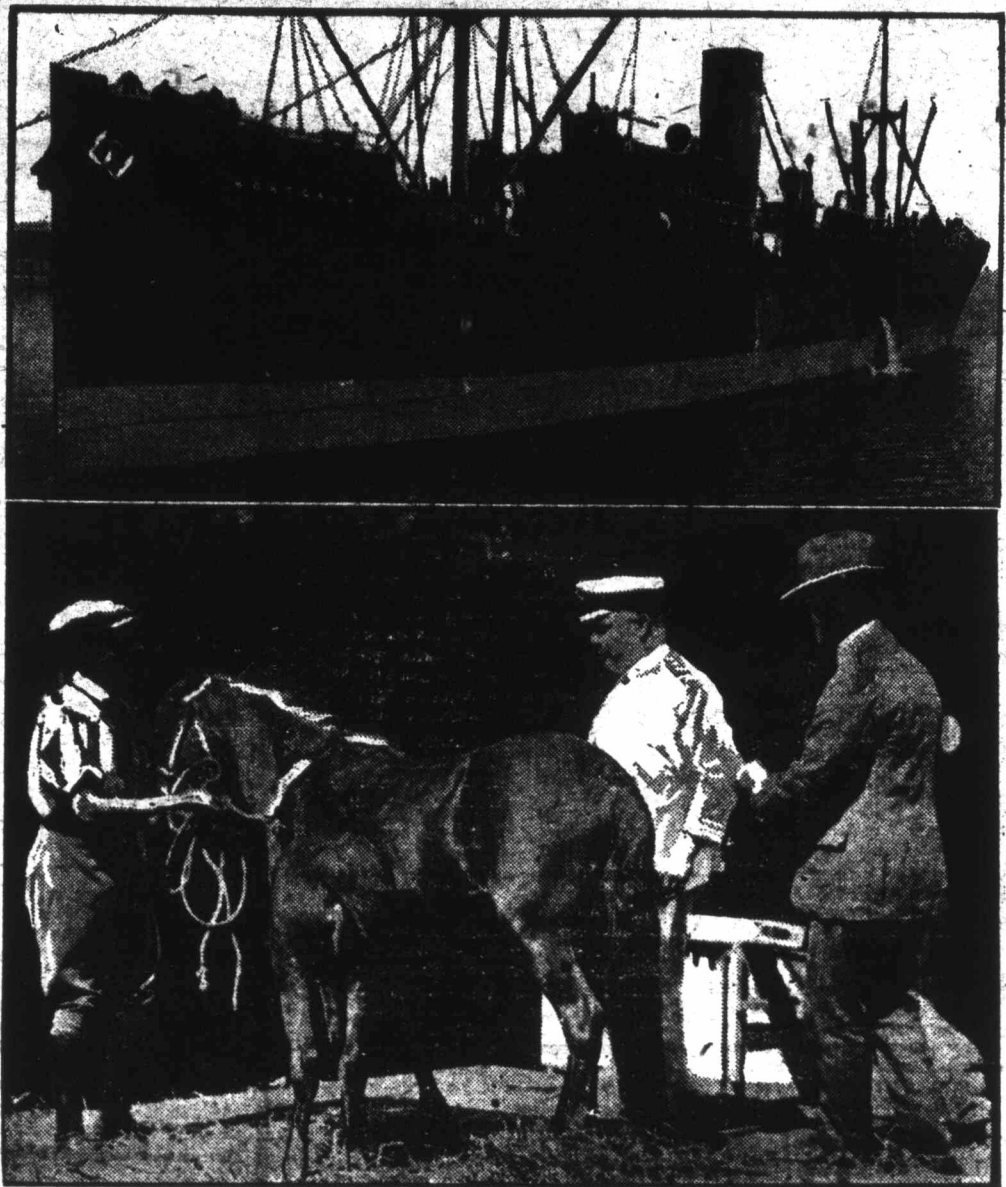
Bye-Elections Sep 20th

Insurance or Assurance

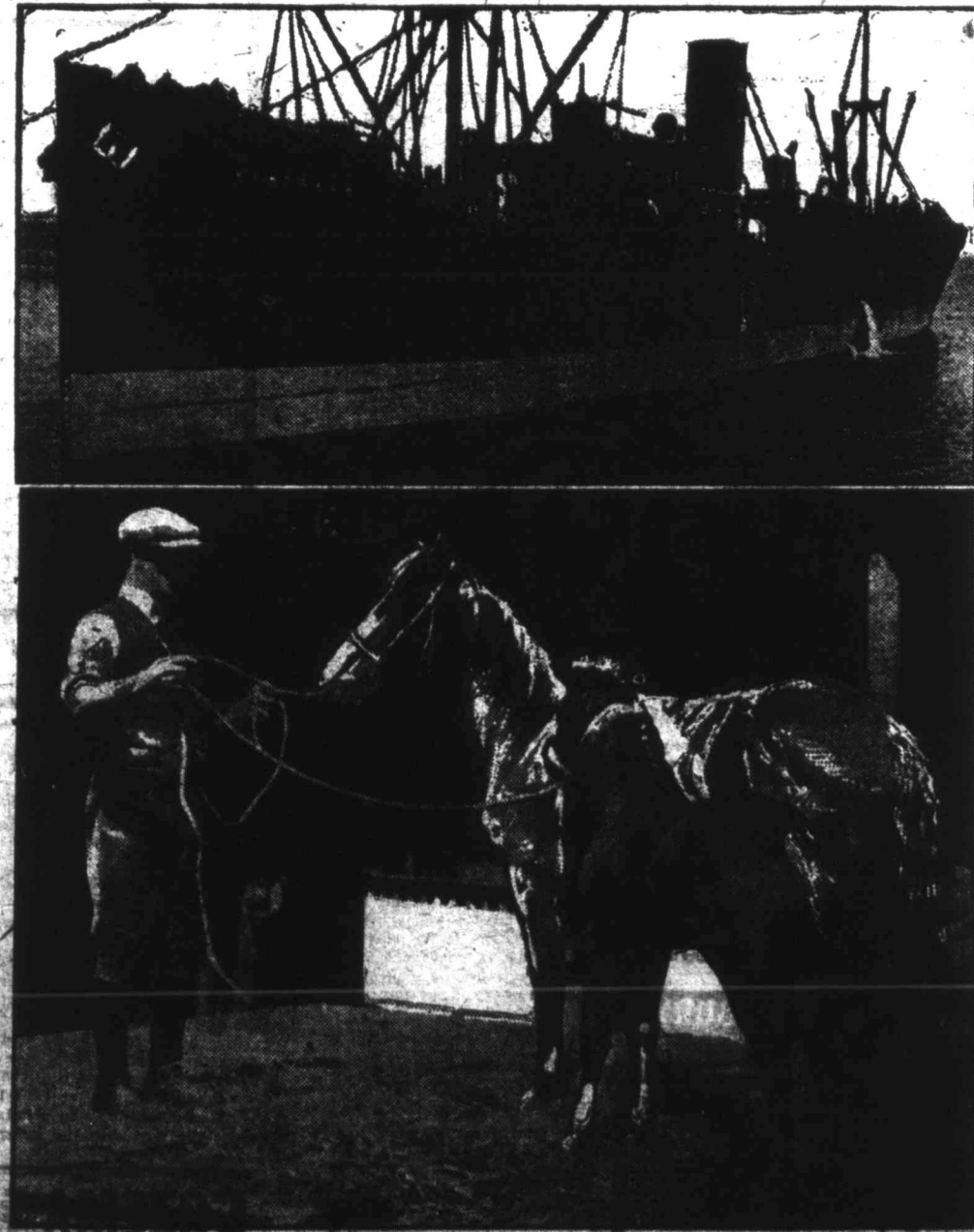
There is how an entire English insurance author draws a distinction between the two terms. On this point the term "assurance" seems likely to be dropped altogether. If life insurance there are two elements, the accumulation of money and the carrying of a risk. In fire and in nearly all other forms of insurance there is only the risk element. This distinction is even faintly recognized by limiting the word "assurance" to the majority of life policies, under which a claim must arise sooner or later, provided the payment of premiums is kept up, and applying the word "insurance" in connection with policies which may or may not become claims. A man may pay premiums for fire insurance for thirty years and have no occasion to make a claim, but he has covered his loss, and he is assured against loss through a happening which might have occurred at any time.
