Approval by the Allied Council of the plan gives to the International Labor Mission to Russia a status that will be little less important than that of a diplomatic mission. Britain will send seven delegates, including Miss Margaret Bondfeld representing the women workers of the Motherland. Canada is also to be represented, Mr. Arthur Martel, Vice-President of the Trades and Labor Congress, having been chosen by organized Labor for that purpose. The British delegation will divide itself into two sections, on of which will examine working and living conditions, whil th othr will gt information on government, trade and economics. The Russian Government has announced its readiness to allow the mission facilities for inquiry into matters on which enlightenment is sought. Properly carried out, the tour of

the mission ought to settle all doubts and perplexities with regard to the Russian situation. The Allies have not added to their reputation by the methods they have pursued toward Russia, and recent changes of attitude reveal a tendency to make a new start in an effort to resume trade and diplematic celationships failing which there can be no real settlement of Europe's problems Russia is too great a country, and her potentialities are tou vast to admit of her being left out of the plans for the future of the old world.
