STILL HOLDING ON.

The Lifeboat Question.

LONDON, To-day. The number of lifeboats carried by trans-Atlantic liners shilling under the regulations of the London Board of Trade before the Titanic disaster, was based on tonnage, not on the number of people aboard, so the Titanic investigators were told by Sir Walter Howell, Chief of the Maritime Division of the Board of Trade. Lord Mersey, interrupting the witness, said it was his opinion that every ship should carry lifeboats to save every person on board.

Pulp Mill Building Started.

It will be remembered that the Telegram a few weeks ago exclusively reported that the Horwood Lumber Co. were about to erect pulp and paper mills at Campbellton. Last week the start was made, and Mr. W. H. Horwood, who is there now, will remain until December looking after the work. The foundations of the various structures have been started, and at present 150 men are hard at work, while others will later be employed. These consist of competent carpenters, carpenters and laboring men. The work of building the dam, which will be of the most modern substantial character, has also commenced, and the plant will be rushed to completion.

Marine Notes.

The R. M. S. Mongolian left port early this morning for Halifax and Philadelphia taking as additional passengers—Mr. G. A. Humphreys, Mr. Poyer and 3 intermediates. The S. S. Tobasco reached Liverpool yesterday after a 9 days passage from St. John's. The S. S. Balaine left Sydney on Tuesday at midnight and is due here this evening. The S. S. Durango arrived at Halifax yesterday afternoon.

Good Fishery.

The schr. Springdale, which arrived here a couple of days ago, reports that at Twillingate last week there was good trapping, some taking from 15 to 40 qts. of cod. At Nipper's Hr. up to date they have had the best trapping for years—40, 70 and 80 brls. being taken in a single haul. One man had a haul of 200 brls., and had enough to keep all his help engaged splitting heading and salting for two days. At LaSalle cod is very plentiful, and from 20 to 50 qts. is the average for traps, while a very satisfactory feature is that hook and line men are also doing good work. The schr. Carrie and Annie, which arrived here last evening reports fine fishing all along the Southern Shore. Some traps to date had as high as 300 qts. ashore. To sum up, generally speaking in Green Bay, White Bay and the French Shore the prospects are bright for a record fishery.

Supreme Court.

Edwin J. Eacrett vs. Archibald Elliott. Action for slander, (continued). Last night at 12.05 a.m. the jury returned to the court after having been out for about fifty minutes, and the foreman announced a verdict in favour of the defendant.

Judgment was accordingly ordered to be entered for the defendant with costs. Mr. Higgins for plaintiff; Mr. Squires for defendant.

Edwin J. Eacrett vs. Arthur Seeley. This is an action for slander, the circumstances being similar to those in the case reported above. The jury were present, but were not called, it being stated to the court that the case would be settled by an apology. Mr. Poole for the defendant tendered an apology, which was accepted by the plaintiff. The apology was as follows: "I hereby apologize to Dr. E. J. Eacrett for the statements made by me at a meeting in Change Islands, on March 1911, and reflecting on his ability as a physician and his attention and conduct as a medical attendant. There was not the slightest foundation in fact for any such statements by me, and I withdraw unreservedly any remarks which may have been uttered by me on the occasion and which have caused Dr. Eacrett to institute proceedings against me."

Each party is to pay its own costs. The matter being thus settled, Mr. Justice Johnson discharged the jury from further attendance. The defendant did not come to town or bring any witnesses.

At the conclusion of the above case Mr. Justice Johnson spoke very strongly on the question of the proper punishment of such cases of slander. He also ordered that proceedings be instituted against Archibald Elliott, the defendant in Eacrett vs. Elliott, for contempt of court, as a letter from Elliott was put in evidence threatening language towards him yesterday, which on the face of it was in the opinion of Mr. Justice

Johnson, an attempt to persuade one of the plaintiff's witnesses from giving evidence. The court then adjourned till 11 a.m. to-morrow.

That Robbery.

Yesterday we referred to a robbery of \$200. This money was taken last week from the residence of Mr. B. Fitzgerald, who is over 70 years of age, and who lives alone at Convent Square, Riverhead. The man had \$360 locked up in a tin safe, which was contained in a trunk in his bedroom, and this also was securely fastened. The thief opened both the trunk and tin box evidently with a chisel during the man's absence. He easily gained admission to the house as the street door was left open. Strange to say the thief was merciful, for he took the \$200 and left \$160 behind. The police have made a pretty shrewd guess who the author of the theft is, but they have not the evidence to lead them to a prosecution. Though so old, Fitzgerald is an able and hardy man and has gone to prosecute the fishery at Maddox Cove.

Rescued Crew.

NEWPORT, To-day. The British steamer Berwindale, arrived with the captain and nine men of the crew of the foundered schooner Fannie, Prescott & Co., Stonington, Conn. The men were rescued from the top cabin of the waterlogged schooner on Monday, after being without food or water for nearly three days.

SPECIAL TO EVENING TELEGRAM. LONDON, To-day. The strike leaders have apparently misjudged the situation in calling a national strike. No more men came out yesterday. The Government has decided to take no Parliamentary action, but to allow the trouble to be fought out by the parties concerned, confining its activities to assisting any negotiations of a mediatory character.

Skirmishes in N.Y. Meat Shops.

Women Poured Kerosene and Carbolic Acid on Meat and Chickens.

New York, June 10.—Among New York's female meat boycotters yesterday there were several skirmishes in which the women, the police and the proprietors of meat shops took part. In several shops the women poured kerosene oil, carbolic acid and other chemicals on meat and chickens. In a number of instances lively fights followed, principally between women and clothing was torn and hair pulled. In some cases windows were smashed by vegetables thrown by the angry women, and one crusader was arrested and held in \$500 bail, charged with having broken a window.

A Win for Driscoll.

Defeated Poesy, the French Feather-weight Champion by Knockout.

London, June 4.—"Jim" Driscoll, featherweight champion of the world and conqueror of "Abe" Attell, lowered the colors of Jean Poesy, the French featherweight champion at the National Sporting Club last night before a crowd which filled every inch of space in the big hall, with a knockout in the twelfth round. The Welshman, master of all points of the game, astonished even his friends by his wonderful showing. He hit his opponent when and where he pleased, and out-generalized, out-fought and out-boxed the Frenchman. Poesy, however, took a terrible beating like a brave man. After he recovered consciousness he shook hands with the winner, who now is said to be ready to meet Johnny Kilbane.

Novel Protests of Hebrews.

Chicago, June 8.—Naked children by the score will, it is planned, appear in streets through the congested quarter of the west side of the city next week as a striking protest against the suffering brought to women and children by reason of the high cost of food. This was decided at a meeting of Hebrew mothers in a west side hall to-day. It is designed to attract the attention of the public, they say, to what they characterize as unacceptably high prices fixed both by wholesalers and retailers upon the only meat they may eat.
