Was Sir Robert Bond's Speech at Little Bay Island.

Sir Robert Bond and colleagues arrived here at 5 o'clock this evening and were received in right royal fashion. Bunting floated from houses and shipping and hundreds of guns thundered a welcome. A telegram was received from Sir Robert in the morning announcing his meeting here to-night and the news went around like wild fire. All along the route of the steamer from her start from Springdale the hill tops and houses were decorated and a fusillade from enthusiastic supporters greeted the visitors every mile of the journey. Port Anson was ablaze of colour and men, women and children cheered along the shore. The public meeting in the hall was a great event in the history of this place. Hitherto it has been a stronghold of Messrs. Strong and Murrell, but the people have at length realized their strength and are masters of the situation. The hall was thronged to its utmost capacity and scores stood outside. Fully 400 were seated. Mr. Jennings confined his remarks to the Union and its alliance with the Liberal Party. Mr. Cliff dealt in a masterly manner with the policy of the Liberal Party and Sir Robert Bond's speech, which lasted for over two hours, was like a mighty torrent and carried everything before it. The hall rang with cheers again and again as the speakers scored their points. The meeting closed with the singing of the King. At Saturday's meeting of the Government Party not a cheer was heard, not a gun was fired and the whole audience left the hall when Capt. Yates rose to speak. This place was determined to show its contempt for a traitor. Victory all along the line is the order of the day.
