The price of Labrador in the Greek market has been re-arranged at 80 - for Labrador all round and the distinction of Choice and Prime has been done away with.

We understand that negotiations renewed for Labrador fish and that there are good hopes of the Exporters being yet able to sell fifty or seventy thousand quintals there before the winter is over. This will certainly be

a great relief to the situation. The free selling of fish this week has already given noticeable improvement in trade on Water Street owing to the money that has been put into circulation.
